CONGRESSIONAL POWER DEFINED BY W. E. BORAH

WASHINGTON, Nov. 8 (AP)—The seven-ninth amendment to the constitution empowers congress to control congressional primaries as well as general elections, to "purge" them of "corruption" in the opinion of Senator Borah, republican, Idaho, and constitutional authority.

Without referring specifically to Senators-Elect Vane, Pennsylvania, and Smith, Illinois, republicans, whose primary campaign expenditures were investigated by the special senate committee and making it clear that he was "not assuming to pass upon a particular sentence" Senator Borah said that "developments during the past few months" will make it imperative "to determine whether the power given to congress over elections" includes the power to deal with the entire process of bringing on and holding the elections— all the machinery by which the representatives and senators are selected and given office.
