UNION'S ELEVEN DEFEATS JOSEPH

Final Score 19 to 9—Contest Played on Slippery Gridiron

UNION, Nov. 8 (Special)—Union high school played its fifth football game of the season Saturday at Joseph and won by a score of 19 to 9. The first half of the game was played in a shower and during the entire game the field was wet and slippery, making fast playing and running practically impossible. Union began the first quarter with a rush and in five minutes had completed three forward passes and bucked the way to a touchdown, netting six points. Just after this rush a Joseph man intercepted another pass when the teams were again near the goal line, and made a spectacular run of 50 yards before Hitchcock finally dove to him. Union's line held and Joseph was forced to punt the ball out of dangerous territory. In the second quarter Joseph completed a pass and secured its only touchdown, but the kick went wide. The score was tied but in a few minutes Union, by end runs and line bucks went over for another score this time securing their extra point. The half ended 13 to 6.

Scores, Field Goal
In the third quarter, Joseph failing to reach the scoring line, compromised by trying a field goal and succeeded, bringing its score up to 9. Union secured another touchdown in the last quarter but failed on a pass for the extra point and the game ended with the ball in the middle of the field. Union's line was too solid for Joseph to buck successfully, while Union ploughed through the Joseph line almost at will. Coach Pitts used two or three second line men during part of the game. Morgan, of Intubler, acted as referee and Wortman, of Union, as head linesman. A delegation of rooters accompanied the team to Joseph.

Three More Games
Union high will have three more games during the year. La Grande here on the 15th, at Enterprise on the 20th and a Thanksgiving game here with Elgin. The girls have started basketball practice and will probably have some of their games before the holidays.

AGGIES TO PLAY TROJANS NOV. 11

PORTLAND, Ore., Nov. 8.—Two crucial games will be played in the Pacific coast conference this week. Thursday the Oregon Aggies will meet Southern California at the new Multnomah stadium in Portland, and Saturday Stanford will face the Washington Huskies at Palo Alto. Neither the Aggies nor the Cards have yet tasted defeat and are the only elevens in the conference with clean slates.

The Trojans will be the Aggies' most difficult hurdle. Possessing the most powerful team ever turned out at the institution, Southern California bowled over everything that came her way until she met Stanford a week ago. In a terrific battle the Cards emerged victors, 13 to 12. Stanford, however, was clearly outplayed and won only when the Trojans failed to convert both their goal kicks after touchdowns.

Should the Aggies emerge victors against the Trojans, then Oregon will stand between them and the championship or a tie with Stanford for the title. Oregon is not considered a powerful opponent, having lost two conference games, to Washington and Stanford, and held to a scoreless tie by Pacific. Hence the Aggies' real test will be against Southern California.

Stanford should have less trouble winning her remaining two games than the Aggies. Besides Washington, the Cards have only to face the California Golden Bears, which held Washington to an exceptionally low score at Seattle Saturday, 12 to 7.

Oregon was idle Saturday, but next Saturday she tackles Washington State college at Pullman. At present the Oregon athletic teams are referred to as the Webfoots, but perhaps by the time they face the Cougars they will have a new nickname. A contest is in progress at the university campus now for a new cognomen to replace "Webfoots" and "Hucks."

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Whether Red didn't like the way that knees are exchanged in the movies—as has been rumored in the press—whether he really was sincere in his belief that he wouldn't act, "One Minute to Play" is a picture that the football fan doesn't want to miss and anyone who enjoys modern youth, whether a sports follower or not, will like it just as well.
