CHIVALRY HOLDS
STAGE AT TRIAL

Witness in Hall-Mills
Trial Refuses to Identify Companion

ROMERVILLE, N. J., Nov. 8 (AP)—Chivalry, believed quite dead, for a moment in the trial of the Hall-Mills case today was found to be only stunned. Robert Rhirling, a millwright and once a truck driver, refused point blank to answer a defense question on cross-examination as to the name of a girl companion in the Rusey's case the night of the slaying of the Rev. Edward W. Hall and Mrs. Eleanor Mills.

Rhirling lost his first bout with defense counsel when he was required to give the name of the young woman who shared his automobile with him but he could not recall it. The court ruled that the name she bore at the time she visited the Rusey-popular the Rusey's name was sufficient.
