CORVALLIS, Ore., Nov. 9 (AP)—The Grange football team was not on the field and did not direct the practice of the Grange team last night due to illness. He was in bed on Saturday but again arose at 10 o'clock. When doctors called yesterday they told him to stay in bed, that if he went to practice that day he would probably be in bed the rest of the season.

The Grange team will play at home today but will leave with the team tomorrow morning for Portland where O. A. C. plays University of Southern California Thursday. This is the first time in the Grange's 12 years of coaching he has missed a practice and he is very much perturbed.

EUGENE, Ore., Nov. 9 (AP)—With the exception of Victor West, punter, passer and punter, the University of Oregon backfield that goes against Washington State college in Pullman Saturday will consist of new faces.

Ira Woodley, regular quarterback, is out with a sprained shoulder. Ord, 155-pound speed merchant, is recuperating from influenza. George Burnell, who paced the other half with Ord, had a bad knee.

Otto Vilms, last year's varsity back, who has been kept out of the line up so far this year because of a bad toe that slowed him up, will probably start in the backfield Saturday. Mori Hagan is being pressed into backfield service, and may get the starting call at the other half. The quarterback post is causing worry. Woodley is not in condition, while George Minnaugh, second string quarter, has a sprained arm, and Bud Clark, third team signal caller, is in the hospital with an acute attack of appendicitis.

Carver Injured
Nick Carter, Oregon center, was injured in the California game and as a result Carl Johnson and Carl Kippel will alternate at the pivot post.

Harold Mangum will fill Heryl Hodges' place at guard. Hodges has a badly bruised leg and shoulder.

The team will probably line up against the Grange with Johnson at center; Mangum and Kerns at guard; Captain Sinclair and Brown at tackle; Smith and Minnaugh at ends; Hagan, quarter; West and Vilms, halves; and Lynn Jones, fullback.
