'CANNED FOODS' WEEK IS NEARING

La Grande Grocers to Begin Observance of Occasion Tomorrow.

With national canned foods week to begin tomorrow, special attention is being paid to this commodity in La Grande. Local grocers are making preparations to take this opportunity to point out the good points of canned goods and will make every effort to make the week—or ten days, as it actually is—a success here.

One of the problems to be discussed during the week is "Why Canned Foods Keep."

How to keep foods fresh is a problem with which everybody is familiar, but which very few really understand. The results of spoilage are common knowledge, the causes have been definitely established only in comparatively recent years through scientific investigation. As canning is the most important of food-preserving industries and has in great measure superseded methods employed in the earlier years of man's history. It is but natural that the industry and other agencies interested in its problems should have devoted much study both to the causes of food spoilage and to the most effective methods of preventing it. Obviously, successful canning, whether in the home or in the commercial canning plants, must be based on a thorough understanding of these causes and methods. These are explained, in simple language, in a statement recently issued by the U. S. department of agriculture.

Enzymes Cause Spoilage
"One of the causes of spoilage is the presence of substances called enzymes in all fresh fruits and vegetables. These enzymes bring about the normal ripening of the products, and, unless checked, they bring on final decay. The heat of cooking and canning checks their action, so it is only necessary to prevent the changes they may bring about between the time the material is gathered and the time it is cooked or canned. This is the reason for the emphasis upon canning fruits and vegetables as soon as possible after they have been gathered."

"The second and more important cause of food spoilage is the action of minute organisms which are present in the air, soil, water and, in fact, on everything—yeasts, molds and bacteria. Yeasts and molds are easier to kill than bacteria and do not cause so much difficulty in canning. Many kinds of bacteria are able, when unfavorable conditions arise, to grow into a so-called spore form, in which they are very difficult to kill. For this reason bacteria are the chief factors to be considered in canning. If all bacteria are killed and the product is sealed airtight, the food is said to be sterilized. The application of heat to foods during canning in order to kill bacteria is called 'pasteurizing.'"

Hundreds of thousands of dollars have been expended by the canning industry in the last 20 years in the scientific study of canning problems. One of the most important of these is to find just what amount of heat is required, and for just what length of time, to sterilize various products. As a result of these studies, both commercial and home canners have been able to occupy a higher place in the food supply of the country.

Charge of Mayhem Placed Against Two California Matrons.

LOS ANGELES, Nov. 6 (AP).—A charge of mayhem was placed against two married women of Whittier, Cal., because they are alleged to have sheared the waist long tresses and incidentally a portion of an ear lobe of a 19-year-old blonde woman, also married, who was "too pretty and too popular."

Mrs. Evelyn Thompson, 19, object of the alleged scissors attack, told district attorney's officers she was inveigled into the home of Mrs. Lucille Houston, who had been "my best chum."

There, she said, Mrs. Houston, assisted by Mrs. Caroline Nutt, forcibly clipped off her hair to the bob stage, jabbed her neck with the shears, pierced her hand and snipped off a piece of her ear.

"It was all caused by jealousy because Caroline and Lucille couldn't reduce as I did and because I was pretty and popular," Mrs. Thompson said.

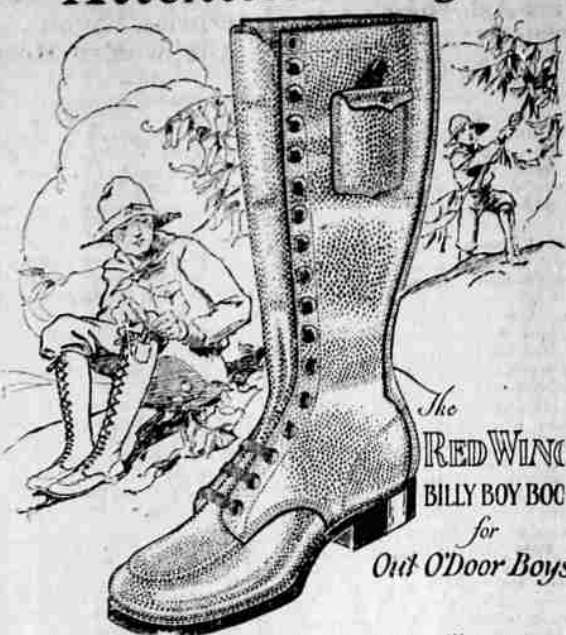
