Fifteen Odd Fellows Become Charter Members of Organization

MRS. ORMISTON MAY BE WITNESS

Keyes Expects to Have Kenneth's Wife Testify at Aimee's Trial.

LOS ANGELES, Nov. 9 (AP)—District Attorney Asa Keyes stated today he was laying plans to confront Aimee Semple McPherson with testimony of Mrs. Ruth Ormiston, wife of the fugitive radio man, Kenneth G. Ormiston; when the evangelist goes before a jury in superior court charged with three counts of felonious conspiracy. Keyes learned today that the wife of the long sought Ormiston expected to arrive here from Australia about Jan. 10. If the former Angelus Temple radio operator is not in custody by that time the case of Mrs. McPherson is called for trial, the district attorney said he would subpoena Mrs. Ormiston as a state witness.

Mrs. Ormiston, with her two children, went to her home in Australia last spring. She was reported to have ordered divorce proceedings filed against her husband but the suit never appeared.

The state, during the preliminary hearing of the evangelist, her mother, Mrs. Minnie Kennedy, and Mrs. Lorraine Wiseman-Schlaff, charged that Mrs. McPherson was an intimate friend of Ormiston's and that she left her in his company on May 13 last instead of in the hands of kidnappers as she declared on her reappearance June 23.

New Discoveries—Investigators today redoubled their efforts to locate Ormiston, as the result of new discoveries said by the prosecution to further link the missing radio man with the evangelist's strange disappearance last May.

By means of a garage claim check, two new witnesses yesterday identified Mrs. McPherson as the woman who visited a Long Beach hotel ten days before she mysteriously disappeared. Ormiston was registered at the hotel on the same day under the name of Frank Gibson, an alias admittedly used by him, the investigators previously learned.

W. R. Cole, owner and manager of the Virginia hotel garage, and Elton Cole, attendant, declared they were positive that the woman was Mrs. McPherson. Both said the woman left her car in their garage on the morning of May 8, with the explanation that she was going to have lunch at the hotel. A claim check was made out for the car in compliance with a city ordinance, they explained. The license number was checked with registration and showed that the car belonged to the evangelist, they added.

The woman returned for her machine three and a half hours later, the witnesses said their rec-

In lieu of a committee investigation however Senator James Reed suggested that the proper and more effective method of getting the facts in the case would be a contest in the senate, disputing Mr. Vare's right to his seat.

Two Astorians Killed as Auto Is Hit by Train

ASTORIA, Ore., Nov. 9 (AP)—William McGregor, prominent Astoria business man, president of the First National bank of this city, president of the Astoria Box company and of the Altoona Packing company and a timberman well known all over the northwest died here at 11 o'clock last night from injuries sustained when his car was struck by a train at the intersection of 10th street with the railroad right of way yesterday afternoon.

Andrew Hainsdale, Astoria, carpenter, who was riding with McGregor, at the time, died at 7 p. m. from terrible injuries sustained in the crash.

The car, struck amblingly by the train, was carried 250 feet along the track trestle extending over the Columbia river before the train was halted. A dog riding in the rear seat of the McGregor car was killed. Witnesses of the accident said that McGregor drove on the track before noticing the train and then stopped his car directly on the rails and tried to back away. McGregor, one of the wealthiest men of this community, had resided in Astoria for the past 50 years.

McGregor was born in 1875 at Cincinnati, Ohio, and came to Astoria in 1875 starting to work as a clerk in a grocery store.
