CONRAD, NYE
ARRESTED BY
L. M. KLETZINGLa Grande Men in Wall-
lowa County Jail on
Liquor ChargesTWO STILL FOUND
OFFICERS REPORTConrad Pleads Guilty to
Possession and Is Fined
\$300—Other Charges
Placed.

Charles Conrad and Howard Nye, both claiming residence in La Grande, are in the Walllowa county jail at Enterprise today facing charges of operating a still and resisting arrest at the point of a gun. Conrad pleaded guilty to a charge of possession of liquor and was fined \$200 but Nye refused to enter a plea until he secured legal advice.

Lewis M. Kletzing, field manager of the National Law Enforcement league, of Portland, assisted by Officer Tom Murray and others, of Enterprise, made the arrest. He declares that, if a conviction can be had on the felony charge, the charge of resisting officers may be dropped. Circuit court is now in session at Enterprise and a speedy disposal of the case is anticipated.

Arrested Near Walllowa.

According to Kletzing, his men apprehended the two near Walllowa near the road to Maxville at 1:30 o'clock yesterday morning in a six-cylinder car loaded with supplies for operation of stills. The two are said to have held off the officers with a revolver until one succeeded in breaking a plate of liquor.

The car, which was loaded with 14 sacks of sugar, 150 pounds of cracked corn, 50 pounds of corn meal, two 5-gallon barrels, two 5-gallon cans, one funnel, two plates of moonshine whiskey and three guns, was confiscated by the officers. Nye and Conrad, brothers-in-law, recently purchased the automobile in La Grande.

After the two were taken before the Enterprise court, Kletzing and his men discovered two stills about 35 miles northwest of Enterprise, of 20-gallon and 60-gallon capacity, respectively. Fourteen 30-gallon moon barrels, two stoves and three coils were also found, according to the officers.

RUCKMAN BUYS

Harvey T. Ruckman, son of Will Ruckman, of Imbler, has purchased a 320-acre tract of farm land near the Red Pepper school house in the Sand Ridge district, known as the George Miller place.

The approximate value of the land is \$100 an acre.

Mr. Ruckman does not expect to farm the land, but bought it principally for speculation purposes, believing that farm land values will be higher soon.

Two resolutions were adopted at the morning session, one requesting the legislature to name a special tax commission to revise the entire state tax and assessment code.

Charles O'Hara
Waives Hearing;
Returns to JailMan Charged with Mur-
der of Jack Sturm Is
Held Without Bail for
Grand Jury.

Without preliminary hearing, Charles O'Hara—charged with murder in the first degree following a coroner's jury verdict holding him to blame for the death of Jack Sturm at a logging camp southwest of La Grande Saturday—was this morning bound over to the grand jury for investigation, and returned to the county jail without bail privilege.

The preliminary hearing, to have been conducted in Judge Hugh E. Brady's court at 1:30 p. m. today, was waived by the defendant's attorneys, Green & Hess, at about 10 a. m. Carl G. Helms, district attorney, represents the state in this matter.

Della Sturm, one of the eye-witnesses of the tragedy testifying at the coroner's inquest, was taken to Enterprise yesterday afternoon by Lee Slusher, acting as deputy for Sheriff Miller, of Walllowa county. Sturm, a cousin of the dead man, was arrested by Deputy Amos Helms at the close of the inquest on a Walllowa county warrant charging drunkenness in a public place.

Shot through the thigh by a glancing bullet fired from a .22 rifle by Floyd Felk, who was shooting at magpies, Della Snyder, 17, sustained a flesh wound yesterday morning that will absent her from her classes at the high school for a few days.

Miss Snyder was sitting on an apple box at her home, near Mt. Glen, waiting for the Felk boys, with whom she was to ride to school. Floyd Felk, with a rifle, was aiming at a magpie, when the bullet glanced from an object it struck, and entered the girl's leg. Her condition is in no way serious, the attending physician said today.

EXPENSES OF
COUNTY SET
AT \$363,463Budget Shows Increase of
\$34,225.54 Over Sum
for Year 1926REDEMPTION OF
BONDS IS CAUSECounty Schools Will Get
\$53,850—\$10 Allowed
for Each Pupil's Edu-
cation.

Based on the estimates of the budget committee, taxes in Union county next year, exclusive of the state levy, will amount to \$363,463.

That is an increase of \$34,225.54 over the county tax over the past year—due mostly to the additional money that must be raised for the redemption of road bonds. A \$30,000 series will have to be retired in 1927. For the last three years, the road bond redemption has been \$60,000 annually.

Of the total, \$67,118.00 is required to meet the general expenses of operating the county government.

Schools Get Big Sum

For county schools, \$53,850.00 must be raised—the amount figured on the basis of \$10 for each of the 5385 pupils in the county. The high school tuition fund, which represents a substantial part of the additional increase over last year's budget, is estimated at \$34,957.16. A school library fund, allowing 10 cents per pupil, is figured at \$53,850.00.

The general road fund to be raised amounts to \$25,000.00 market roads \$10,000.00; interest on road bonds \$52,000.00; and the road bond redemption, as already stated, \$30,000. Nine hundred dollars for the care of indigent soldiers is also allowed.

Receipts include the general fund, comprising fees from the sheriff and clerk's office, interest on deposits, fines, and the estimated balance of \$2,400, will total about \$15,450. Automobile licenses are expected to bring in \$22,000.00, and the county's 75 per cent of forest rentals, \$7,500.00.

The total of receipts, \$44,950.00, subtracted from the total of estimated expenditures, \$408,412.66, gives the \$363,462.66, or the amount to be raised by county tax levy.

Pendleton and La Grande Teams
Play Tomorrow—Tigers Favorites

Two fighting teams are scheduled to furnish the fans a bundle of thrills and plenty of excitement tomorrow afternoon at the Pendleton Round-Up park when La Grande and the Burkholder clash in their annual contest.

The two eleven, traditional rivals, are fairly even in strength, according to pre-game indications, but La Grande—despite the injuries to Captain Smith—is favored to win by a slight margin, possibly a loughdown.

Close Game Foreseen.

The Pendleton squad has suffered three defeats in a row and is pointing toward the La Grande game with hopes of returning to the win column. Observers at the Walla Walla-Pendleton game last Saturday report that Pendleton's greatest weakness, aside from green material, is in tackling and in blocking forward passes. The team, however, is a fighting unit and is capable of showing sports of strength that puts it into the dangerous class.

The Blacks will be stronger than last Saturday, too, because Sullivan, veteran punter and pass snapper, is back in the lineup. Garden, who injured his leg Saturday, is also expected to start the game at 2 o'clock.

RAIL MERGER
IN THE WEST
IS FORECASTGreat Northern, North-
ern Pacific and Bur-
lington PrincipalsBILLION AND HALF
DOLLARS INVOLVEDEventual Extension into
California Would Re-
sult from Consolidation
Is Rumor.

NEW YORK, Nov. 10. (AP)—Consolidation of the Great Northern, the Northern Pacific and the Burlington railroads with an eventual extension into California is forecast, says the Herald-Tribune today in a statement made by Arthur Curtiss James at St. Paul where he went to attend a meeting of the Great Northern directors. Such a consolidation would embrace more than 28,000 miles of line with a total capital of \$1,500,000,000. The newspaper says that in reply to a question of the representative of Dow, Jones and company as to whether his recent large purchases of Western Pacific stock indicated that through a merger the Burlington would run into San Francisco, Mr. James said:

Eventual Extension Seen.

"The Burlington has been using the Denver and Rio Grande and the Western Pacific for years to make a connection with San Francisco. There is no need for any more extension in that direction. But I look to see eventually the extension of the northwest lines into California. It was James J. Hill's dream when he built the Great Northern, and his visions generally come true."

The Herald says:

"Mr. James was quoted as expressing the opinion that it is only a question of time until the two northern roads and the Burlington will be merged, and saving such a merger is the most logical thing to do, since it will leave the northwest with two great transcontinental systems—the Consolidated Northern and the St. Paul."

"Charles Donnelly, president of the Northern Pacific, was quoted in a dispatch from St. Paul, Minn., as saying that Mr. James merely was expressing an opinion in favor of the merger."

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Workmen Busy at
Emigrant Springs

Work was started today at Emigrant Springs by the state highway commission cutting out the weeds, growth and removing many of the smaller trees there. With the brush and scrubby trees removed the larger and healthier trees will be given a better opportunity to grow, which will add to the beauty of the park.

Workmen for the highway commission will also burn the old logs left along the right of way when the highway was constructed between the main pass and Kamela within the next three weeks. These logs were given the property owners along the highway when they were first cut to make room for the highway, but they were never hauled away. They are unfit for wood now so will be burned.

The contract for a building at Emigrant Springs park will probably be let at the November meeting of the state highway commission.

MARRIED AGAIN

Religious Ceremony Follows Wedding Performed Thursday

BRUSSELS, Nov. 10. (AP)—Crown Prince Leopold and Princess Astrid, of Sweden, were married at 11:15 o'clock this morning in the St. Gudule cathedral.

The crush of the crowds around the cathedral was so great that many women and children were injured. No fatalities were reported, but scores were taken to the hospital or treated for their injuries in nearby drug stores.

It was the greatest demonstration to occur in Brussels since the armistice day, eight years ago tomorrow.

Today's religious ceremony followed the civil wedding performed in the Swedish royal palace at Stockholm last Thursday.

The 25-year-old bridegroom who walked rather awkwardly up the main aisle of the cathedral will, in the natural course of events one day rule over Belgium, while the little bride will be his queen.

But today, to the 200,000 persons lining the magnificent streets and avenues of Brussels, they were simply Leopold and Astrid. The cortege of kings, royal princes and nobles, from dukes to barons, passed almost unnoticed so eager were

Fraud Evidence
Discovered in
Quaker CountsThree Election Judges to
Answer to Grand Jury
—Other Discrepancies
Revealed.

PHILADELPHIA, Nov. 10 (AP)—Evidence of fraud has been discovered in at least one precinct in last week's election, when unofficial returns showed zero for William B. Wilson, democratic candidate for U. S. senator, in more than a score of the city's 1500 precincts, in the opinion of the election court.

Judge James Gay Gordon so asserted in holding three election officials of the second division of the 36th ward in \$1,000 bail each for the grand jury when a recount of the ballot in the division revealed that Mr. Wilson had received five votes and that other democratic candidates also had been voted up.

The return sheets on election night gave 235 votes to each of the republican candidate, headed by Congressman William S. Vare for the senate, with zero marks behind the names of democratic and other candidates. The returns showed 235 votes for Vare, 289 for John S. Fisher, republican gubernatorial candidate, five for Wilson and three for Judge Eugene C. Bonnell, democratic candidate for governor.

Discrepancies were found in the unofficial count in several of the other "zero" divisions, notably the 14th and the 24th ward.

EGYPTIAN TOMB
YIELDS RICHESDr. Reisner, of Harvard,
Reports Findings Near
Pyramid Ghiza

CAIRO, Nov. 8. (AP)—Dr. George A. Reisner, assistant professor of Egyptology at Harvard university, has issued a report describing the work he has done on the tomb of Queen Nefetephe, mother of King Cheops and wife of Senefert, first sovereign of the fourth dynasty. The report says the identification of the tomb is based on two inscriptions in gold hieroglyphics on the back of a carrying chair.

Dr. Reisner asserted that he found evidence that Nefetephe died some time after Cheops came to the throne and was buried at Dashur, on the west bank of the Nile and directly south of the great pyramid. The tomb was rifled by thieves and when the violation was discovered Cheops' secretary transferred the body to a new tomb at the entrance of the pyramid Ghiza. This tomb is a vertical shaft cut 100 feet through the limestone with the chamber opening from the bottom. Everything in the former tomb was brought out, even the things the thieves had smashed.

Many discoveries included a bed and three chairs, all intact, 60 in. in length and 10 in. wide. The bed was solid gold, 16 of copper and the remainder of flint; a dozen wooden panels with inlaid floral designs.

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Senate Adjourns
Until December 13

WASHINGTON, Nov. 10 (AP)—Meeting in special session as a court of impeachment, the senate today received official notification of the resignation of George W. English as federal judge or Eastern Illinois and then adjourned until Dec. 13.

This was done to give the house time to act on the recommendation to be made by its prosecutors that the proceedings instituted against English charging usurpation of power and other "high misdemeanors" be discontinued in view of the resignation of the jurist.

The senate session of the court lasted just eight minutes.

Sinister Motive Seen in Visit of
Queen Marie by Hoboes of America

OMAHA, Neb., Nov. 10. (AP)—A "sinister motive in the visit of Queen Marie to the U. S. while Emma Goldman, departed Russian anarchist, is barred from entry to this country," is seen by speakers at the national convention of hoboes.

A resolution, offered by John L. Jones, Kansas City labor party, asserted "two sides" with which the organized propaganda making in this democracy, in favor of a monarchy by the paradigm of Queen Marie while soviet Russia is rejected."

Particularly offensive the speaker declared, was the fact that railroads are furnishing Queen Marie with free transportation while hoboes are obliged to steal rides at the risk of jail.

DEATH LIST
IN LA PLATA
REACHES 15Two Score or More School
Children Injured in
Wind StormVIVID STORIES ARE
TOLD BY SURVIVORSTots in School House Had
No Warning—Some
Carried Quarter of a
Mile by Tornado.

LA PLATA, Md., Nov. 10 (AP)—This little town of 500 souls sloped in sorrow today to take up again the usually placid threads of its existence which were sheared suddenly yesterday afternoon by the wrath of a tornado that wreaked havoc and destruction along a path at times 500 yards wide through a portion of Southern Maryland, killing 15 and injuring two score, mostly school children here, and severely injuring four more at Carrollville, 14 miles north-east of here.

Sweeping up from out of the Potomac the disturbance swooped and twisted intermittently but concentrated its fury upon the school house here where 61 pupils, teachers and attendants were gathered. Eleven of the children were killed and most of the others injured when the building was destroyed.

Damage Runs High.

At least a dozen other farm houses and barns were leveled and the damage was estimated at thousands of dollars.

Out of the chaos and welter in the wake of the whimsical, wrathful winds there came today stories of heroic stoicism and a queer intermingling of humor in the tale of the tragedy.

John Marshall Burr, a hysterical 11-year-old with blood streaming from his wounds, ran from the school house, resplendent with the screams of the wounded and imprisoned, to the home of the Rev. W. S. Hahnemann, Episcopal rector. "Please telephone everybody," he sobbed in fear and pain, "the whole school house has blown away."

School Levelled.

Almost all the population of the town followed the boy to the top of the knoll where the school had stood, but stood no longer. His contents, human and inanimate, were strewn over a radius of more than a quarter of a mile.

Some of the children had been blown at least 750 feet. Other bodies were impaled against trees in mute evidence of the storm's devastation.

There had been, according to Miss Ethel Graves, 22-year-old teacher of the elementary class which consisted of 35 of the younger children, no warning and no time to anticipate, or avoid the shock. Cut and bruised about the eyes, she had refused medical attention until she knew everything possible had been done for her charges.

"It was just a few minutes before 3 o'clock," she said, "that I

KANSAS CITY, Mo., Nov. 10. Workmen today were inspecting and decorating the stands which will accommodate more than 5,000 of the throng expected to assemble at the huge monument. In addition to the president and Queen Marie, representatives of the church, the military and many patriotic and civic organizations will take part in the ritual.

Arrangements for the entertainment of the presidential and royal parties were virtually complete.
