PORTLAND, Ore., Nov. 10 (AP)—The Trojans of the University of Southern California were today preparing for their battle for the Multnomah stadium gridiron tomorrow with the Orange warriors of Oregon Agricultural college. The Aggies with their coach, Schuster, were to arrive today. Schuster is recovering from an attack of sickness, will direct that practice this afternoon. He is still under physician's care.

Burned Area Will Be Rebuilt, Report

KLAMATH FALLS, Ore.—Four brick buildings, recently announced, will help to fill up the gap left by the Chiloquin fire of the last month, which wiped out 13 business houses on First avenue of the reservation center. The business blocks will all be constructed this fall.

George Bell, stage-line operator, has announced the construction of a \$25,000 building on the site of his former building on First avenue, destroyed by fire. The structure will be of brick and reinforced concrete. First floor will be utilized for office space and storerooms, the upper story for apartments.

J. Hirt Jr., of Klamath Falls, has announced the construction of a \$25,000 brick business block on First avenue. He will construct the new building has been secured from the Chiloquin city council and work will start immediately. The first floor will be used for storerooms and the second for apartments.

Adjacent to the Bell building will go up a \$10,000 one-story brick building, to be constructed by W. J. Steinmetz, whose building was taken by the fire.

Still another structure will be built by George Stergios, who was also "burned out." He will put up a three-story \$15,000 brick hotel.

FEMININE DAIL MEMBERS

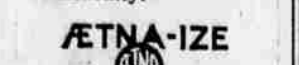

CENSOR'S HAND FELT BY QUEEN

Prime Minister Petresco to Be Mouthpiece of Rumanian Royalty

QUEEN MARIE'S TRAIN EN ROUTE TO DENVER, Nov. 10 (AP)—Queen Marie is not disturbed at the thought that virtual censorship is to guide her conversations with newspapermen aboard her train, as announced last night by Professor Nicholas Petresco, who is representing the Rumanian prime minister on the tour.

M. Petresco's chief concern is guarding against utterances by her majesty which might have disturbing political significance at home, but Marie has undiminished confidence in her own ability as a diplomat and politician to handle delicate situations.

Queen Not Responsible
In making the announcement the professor, who is a member of the people's party now in power in Rumania, explained that the queen has not been required by law to swear to uphold the constitution and cannot be held responsible for her declarations. He recalled also that the government which at first objected to the American tour, has enjoined her majesty from granting interviews in which she is to be quoted by newspapers.

The professor also advised correspondents aboard the train that he is to be the channel through which news of the royal family will reach the press. That function has been performed heretofore by Major Stanley Washburn, special aide to the queen.

Difference between various

groups aboard the train were touched upon last night at a dinner intended as a compliment to Governor Nellie T. Ross of Wyoming and attended by the Rumanian party and the American personnel. Major Washburn, however, did not attend. He said difficulty had been encountered in finding seats at the table for the 21 guests and so he omitted himself.

Railroads Praised
After Governor Ross had expressed her hope that the visitors had enjoyed seeing her state, which is about the size of the kingdom of Rumania, Colonel John H. Carroll, in charge of the train, explained that the railroads over which Marie is traveling had made it possible for her to tour America. He pointed out that no one other than the railroads had contributed to the project.

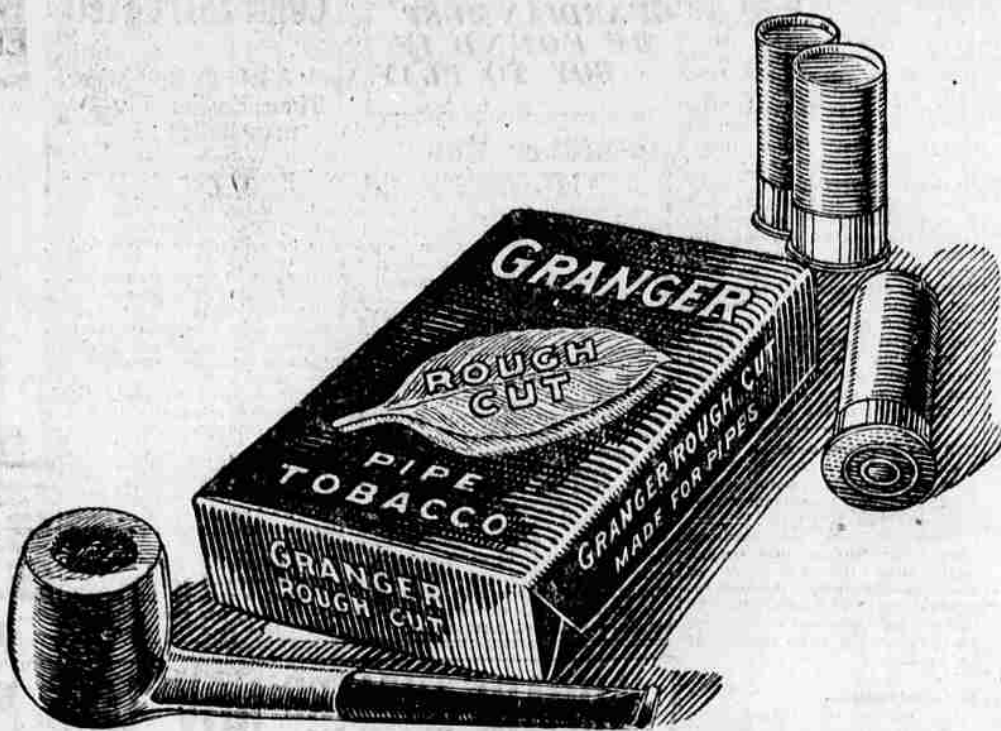
