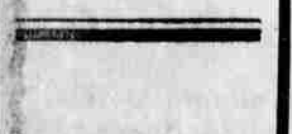
**THE "INSIGNIFICANT MINORITY"**

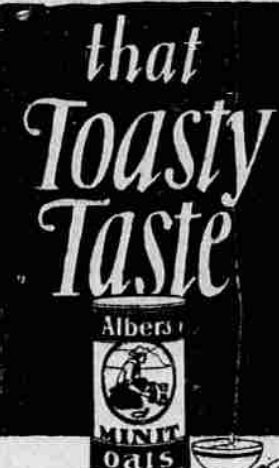

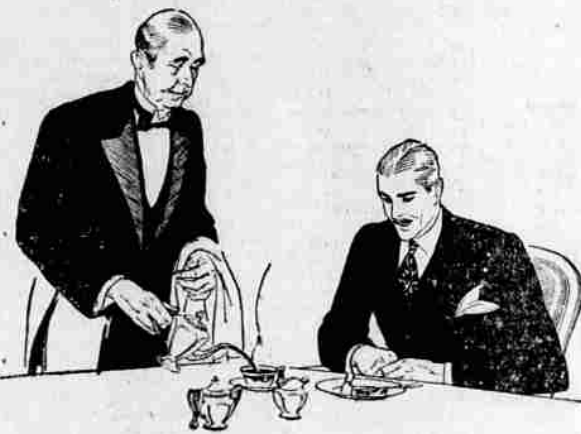
