North Bend Bank Sued for \$10,700

COLUMBIA, Ore.—W. M. Payne, Marshfield contractor, has filed suit in circuit court here for \$10,700 against the Citizens State bank of North Bend, and Ira Padrick and J. P. Gardner of North Bend. Payne claims that the defendants had him indicted and that he was arrested and jailed and that later the indictment was dismissed. The indictment charged him with obtaining money under false pretenses. He asks \$500 attorney fees, \$100 for loss of business, and \$10,000 for damages to his reputation and for convenience.

Game Farm Will Be Help to Menu

COTTAGE GROVE, Ore.—C. A. Bartlett, proprietor of the Hotel Bartlett, who with his partner, Tom Rugh, of Eugene, is operating a wild game farm near here, announces that within a short time he hopes to be able to include venison and trout on his daily hotel menu this year round.

The farm is known as the Wolf Creek Fur Farm and is one of the largest wild game farms in the west. It is located on Wolf creek between Lyons and Crow and consists of 195 acres. There are already 86 head of deer on the grounds and the fish ponds are heavily stocked. There will be sufficient increase within a few months to permit Mr. Bartlett to serve these choice orders from his grill room.

It is Mr. Bartlett's intention to also have beaver, mink and muskrat for their furs. The deer herd was started two years ago when two or three were kept in a small park across from the hotel in Cottage Grove. It was the ambition then, of Mr. Bartlett to start just such a farm as he now has.

Marshfield's 1926 Paving Work Ends

MARSHFIELD, Ore.—This week will mark the closing of the 1926 municipal improvement program for Marshfield, for the last of this year's 22 street paving and sewer projects will be completed within the next day or so, according to E. K. Burton, city engineer, who supervised the work. The cost of the streets improved this year, including the sewer construction, amounts to \$171,855.98. A. B. Gidley Saturday completed laying the last concrete on the sidewalks on Fir, Date and Eighth streets and Hugh McLean and Leo McLean will complete their sub-contract on the Kruse avenue sewer in a few days and this will find up all the work.

Lane's Property Valuation Higher

EUGENE, Ore.—Assessed valuation of property in Lane county this year is \$2,627,404, greater than in 1925, according to the assessment summary completed by Ben P. Kennedy, assessor. The total assessed valuation this year is \$39,521,422 as compared with \$37,299,992 in 1925. The assessor's description this year amount to \$1,551,515, leaving a valuation of \$2,627,404 for taxation. The greater increase this year was in the item "improvements on land and city lots" according to the summary. This shows an advance from \$5,204,750 in 1925 to \$5,884,715 this year, an increase of \$679,965 which represents almost the entire increase in the summary.

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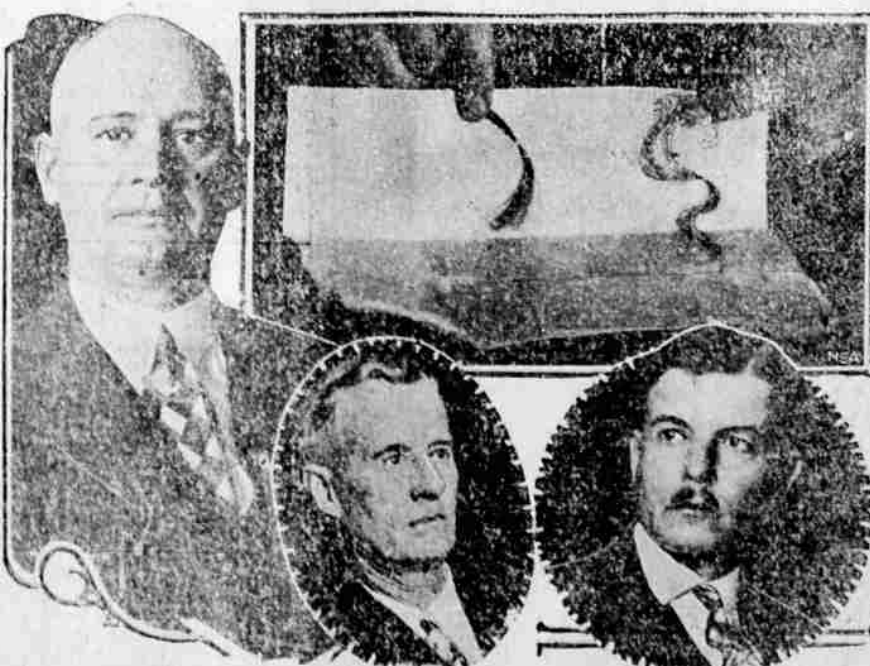
