TIGERS WIN ON ZUNDEL'S 70-YARD RUN

Uphill Fight Ends with La Grande on Long End of 19 to 13 Score

THRILLS FEATURE ANNUAL CONTEST

Pendleton Finds Blue and White Unbeatable Despite Loss of Captain Smutz.

La Grande 19, Pendleton 13. Just as the twilight was beginning to settle over Round-up park, with less than two minutes to play and the Tigers on the short end of a 12 to 13 score, Tubby Zundel, flashy blue and white end, dashed, dodged and twisted his way 70 yards upfield for a winning touchdown that climaxed an already thrilling game with a regular story book flourish.

That wasn't the sum total of Tubby's achievements at Pendleton, either.

A 35-yard run to touchdown after receiving a forward pass on the line of scrimmage, netted La Grande's first touchdown in the second period and throughout the game Tubby played stellar ball, breaking up more than one offensive thrust on the part of the Buckaroos.

Altogether, it was simply too much Tubby for Pendleton to win.

Tigers Fight Valiantly

And along with Tubby, the 10 other Tigers on the field were continually covering themselves with glory. Fighting like the cat they are named after, they never ahead until the final touchdown—carried on like men possessed, refusing to concede defeat.

MacKenzie's machine yesterday, weakened by the absence of Captain Smutz, tackle, played as a unit throughout the game, each man performing his allotted tasks in sparkling fashion. Fighting for the breaks and taking advantage of them, resulted in the second touchdown that prepared the way for victory.

Block Point Pays Way

Pendleton had been ripping through the line for yardage but finally was forced to punt to La Grande's 25-yard line. Three plays failed to gain much yardage and Lyman punted to the Bucks 15-yard line. On the second play the Tiger forwards smashed through and blocked the punt, recovering on the Bucks 23-yard line. With four downs to make, nine in it looked like a score but when the four plays had been executed, the ball was six inches from the goal.

Armistice Day Church Service Attracts Many

Protestant Congregations of City Gather in Evening Session; Legion Has Dance.

Although La Grande streets were deserted all day yesterday while La Grander called to Pendleton for a joint celebration of Armistice day, two local events attracted several hundreds of them home for the evening.

At Zuber hall, the American Legion received 216 couples for a dancing party that added materially to the fund for the entertainment of the state convention here next summer.

Church Service Held

A more serious observance of the holiday at the First Baptist church drew a congregation in which Methodists, Baptists, Presbyterians, Nazarenes, Episcopalians, Lutherans, South Methodists and Salvation Army members were united.

The Rev. Oliver Riley, rector of St. Peter's, delivered the address calling upon the peoples of all denominations to recognize that the kingdom of God is the only hope for permanent peace.

"When Jesus Christ is re-introduced into the homes, the schools and the community life, when we have a genuinely religious people, we may hope for peace," he said.

The league of nations, the world court, disarmament councils, debt cancellations—all such panaceas for peace must fail because they are promulgated by men and fall short of accomplishment because of human weakness, the rector explained.

Legion's Viewpoint

Speaking from the legionnaire's point of view, the speaker declared that those who were at the front gained a vision of war that those who stayed at home had no chance to get.

He finished with a discussion of the mechanics of prayer, which he said were meditation, desire, petition, expectancy, and thanksgiving.

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TAX TURNOVER IS MADE BY DEPUTY

Treasurer Receives \$148,889.49 Today—\$150,000 Yet Due

A turnover of \$148,889.49 in last half year's taxes was made by Amos Helms, head of the tax department of the sheriff's office, today to Mrs. Florence Bacon, county treasurer, from whom the money will be accredited to districts and funds.

There is still about \$150,000 in mail and window receipts to be listed and prepared for the next turnover, due about Nov. 23, the deputy estimated.

That will leave about \$100,000 of the year's levy of \$865,297.04 under the class of delinquent taxes, including today's turnover, \$148,889.49, has been received by the county treasurer this year.

CAULDRON OF WAR BUBBLES OVER MEXICO

Military Uprising Is Reported in State of Guanajuato

OBREGON MAY HAVE PART IN REBELLION

General Gallego, Recently Loyal Officer, Heads Troops in Newest Revolution.

SAN ANTONIO, Nov. 12 (AP)—Rumblings of serious defections in Mexico have reached San Antonio and reports of disturbances were given credence in authoritative Mexican sources.

A number of persons prominent in launching the Madero revolution from San Antonio in 1910, said the General Juan Gallego, who recently resigned from the Calles army, is now actively engaged in leading a military uprising in his home state of Guanajuato.

Obregon's Hand Seen

Sam C. Beldon, San Antonio attorney who was personal attorney for President Francisco Madero and has long been closely identified with local Mexican interests, said that General Gallego's activities no doubt had direct connections with former President Alvaro Obregon.

Gallego was a division commander under President Obregon, and engineered the defeat of General Estrada in the ill-fated De La Huerta revolt against Obregon in 1924. Obregon saw a direct connection between Gallego's recent resignation from the Calles army, his present opposition against Calles, and Obregon's announced intention to set aside that part of the 1917 constitution that makes it impossible for a president of Mexico to stand for re-election.

Gallego is reported to be an orthodox Catholic, and it is predicted that logical leadership of the hierarchy in their movements against the Calles administration will be up in him at the proper time. Obregon is reported to have been active in opposition to the Calles church regulations.

Settlement of British Strike May Come Soon

Negotiations Take Dramatic Turn—Government to Take Hand, Statement Says.

LONDON, Nov. 12 (AP)—Revived negotiations for a settlement of the British coal strike took a dramatic turn today when a statement was issued from No. 10 Downing street indicating that the mine owners were not in accord with the projected terms of settlement.

The statement said that if the miners should accept the terms offered by the government the Baldwin ministry would proceed with legislation to make them effective despite the mine owners' objections.

The statement says:

"In order to prevent any possible misapprehension, the government thinks it desirable to make clear that the proposed terms of a settlement presented to the miners' federation last night, although they were communicated to the president of the mining association at the same time as to the miners' federation, do not represent an agreement with the colliery owners. If they are accepted and carried out by the miners, the government will proceed independently with the legislation proposed."

SENATE CONTROL BATTLE BEGINS

Republicans Urged to Re-Arm Frazier—Ask Maine to Pick G. O. P.

WASHINGTON, Nov. 12 (AP)—Preliminary skirmishes in the fight that looms over control of the senate in the seventeenth congress have begun, although the organization of that body still is a year away.

Facing the possibility of a situation similar to that of three years ago, when republican insurgents joined with democrats in forcing selection of a democrat as chairman of the powerful interstate commerce commission although all other chairmanships were held by republicans, Senator Borah, Idaho, has suggested that party leaders permit Senator Lynn J. Frazier, North Dakota, to reject the republican ranks after two years of wandering in the senate as a lone figure since his banishment from the party councils.

Indications that the republicans will make every effort to organize the new senate also were found in the appeal made by Senator Curtis, Kansas, the party leader, to the republicans of Maine to elect one of their number to the special election on Nov. 23 to fill the vacancy caused by the death of Senator Bert M. Fernald.

But even if the republicans win that contest, their position at the helm remains precarious because they will have only 47 seats in the new senate with the democrats having the same number and the other two held by Senator Shipstead, former labor, Minnesota, and Senator Frazier.

If the latter votes with the republicans, that party would need only one more vote to have a clean majority for organization, provided all the insurgents vote as republicans until the senate offices had been filled.

Catholics Annul Vanderbilt Wedding

ROME, Nov. 12 (AP)—The marriage of the Duke of Marlborough and the former Consuelo Vanderbilt of New York in 1895, has been annulled by the Roman Catholic diocesan court of Southwick according to a semi-official statement given out today at the Vatican.

The semi-official statement says that the annulment was granted first by the Southwick courts and was then confirmed by the holy rota tribunal in July of this year and that the interested parties were notified at the beginning of August.

Bill Would Check Radio 'Opinions'

LOS ANGELES, Nov. 12 (AP)—Jack Evans, state senator of Monrovia, said today he was preparing a bill to be introduced at the next session of the legislature designed to prevent radio stations from broadcasting "opinionated" details, statements or assumptions of fact dealing with pending criminal cases.

Senator Evans said the bill was not aimed directly at Almerie Semple McPherson, evangelist, who has put on the air from time to time "bulletins" concerning the criminal conspiracy charges against her. The bill would be designed, he said, as a measure to safeguard justice.

Shelton Gangsters Bomb Birger House

HARRISBURG, Ill., Nov. 12 (AP)—The warfare between the Birger and Shelton bootleg gangs developed a new method today when an airplane flew over the Birger farmhouse ten miles west of here and dropped three bombs, one of which exploded when it landed 100 yards from the resort. No damage was done.

WORLD COURT DECLARATION IS APPROVED

Senators Generally Favorable to President Coolidge's Views

WALSH, SWANSON AGREE IN MATTER

Nations Must Accept the American Reservations or U. S. Will Remain on Outside.

WASHINGTON, Nov. 12 (AP)—Mixed feelings in which approval seemed to predominate were expressed today in senatorial comment upon President Coolidge's declaration yesterday at Kansas City, that there would be little prospects of American adherence to the world court unless the nations now members accepted the senate's reservations.

"Mighty good so far as it goes," said Senator Borah, republican, Idaho, who led the group of 13 senators in vigorous opposition to American adherence even with the reservations but Senator Bruce, democrat, Maryland, staunch supporter of the court with safeguarding reservations, declared that "the world court will survive this veto-dictum."

Moses Praised Coolidge

"Fortunately for the country, the president remains a sterling American," said Senator Moses, republican, New Hampshire member of the foreign relations committee. "And no better occasion has been found for the concluding declaration of the presidents address than Armistice day, which marked the culmination of American participation in foreign affairs."

"The president's speech sets the index for the American attitude toward world events and I go with him into declaring that the deliberate action of the senate, in ratifying the protocol of the so-called world court, marks the limit of American entanglements in old world politics."

Senators Agree

Senator Walsh, Montana, democrat, who helped phrase the reservations and was a leader in the senate fight for ratification, said "the president's speech accurately expressed the attitude of the senate." Senator Swanston, democrat, Virginia, whose name is borne by the reservations which aroused world wide discussion and disclamation on the part of some member nations to accept them, took virtually the same attitude as Senator Walsh.

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40,000 Strikers, Beaten, Hunting For Employment

NEW YORK, Nov. 12 (AP)—More than 40,000 cloak and suit workers, losers in an 18-week strike, today faced the task of getting new jobs.

A "three-year agreement" by which the workers give up their "right to the job" held since 1900 and demands for a 40-hour week, has been reached by one of the three groups involved. The others are expected to make similar settlement.

Formal ratification still is pending but the strike is considered to have ended last night when representatives of 2,500 employees and the Industrial Council of Cloak, Suit and Skirt Manufacturers, Inc., known as the "inside" manufacturers, agreed upon terms.

The new agreement calls for a 42-hour week for the first two years and a 40-hour week for the third year. It partly follows recommendations of an advisory committee appointed by Governor Smith.

Wage increases over the old minimum scale of \$4 to \$9 per week are stipulated. Strikers are estimated to have lost \$30,000,000 in wages, while the loss to manufacturers also run into millions.

Robbers Escape With \$140,000.00

LA PORTE, Ind., Nov. 12 (AP)—The People's Trust and Savings bank of La Porte was held up and robbed today by five men who escaped with \$140,000 of which \$40,000 was cash and the remainder securities.

Coolidges on Way To White House

COLUMBUS, O., Nov. 12 (AP)—President and Mrs. Coolidge broadcasted on wheat prices and saunas in a "wheat-cakes-and-sauna-town" today. The executive's special train, en route from Kansas City to Washington, stopped in Urbana, Ohio, this morning just as the president and "first lady" had finished a typically American breakfast, such as delighted Queen Marie of Rumania.

President and Mrs. Coolidge appeared on the rear platform of the train and greeted the crowd of early risers that lined the Urbana station platform while the engine took on water. The only previous stop had been at Indianapolis at 5 a. m.

Maniac Marksman Sought in Chicago

CHICAGO, Nov. 12 (AP)—A maniac marksman was sought today by police unable to explain otherwise the shooting of two young girls in neighboring southern suburbs within a period of 24 hours.

The wounding of 14-year-old Esther Haase had not seemed so mysterious at first but with a succession of cold trails the circumstances became as baffling as those of the slaying of Victoria Dorothy Delmonte, 15-year-old high school girl.

State Officers Arrest Many in Wallowa County

ENTERPRISE, Ore., Nov. 12 (Special)—Early this week State Officers Colman, Murray, Caroon and Kietzing raided a still owned by J. F. and M. L. O'Malley, eight miles east of Joseph and found a quantity of mash and four gallons of liquor.

They also arrested C. J. Wilson for having liquor in his possession, they report.

Tuesday they arrested Polman Garrett after having searched his home at Florio, where they may have found a half-gallon of moonshine whiskey, a sack of bottles and two quarters of venison.

3 NEGROES AND ONE WHITE SHOT

HOUSTON, Tex., Nov. 12 (AP)—A young Texas rancher fired a charge of murder and his suspects were sought by sheriffs in the brush country near here following two shooting frays this week in which a white man and three negroes were slain.

The shooting of Wallace Crowder, a rancher, Sunday by a negro is believed by officers to have led to a raid on a log cabin Wednesday by seven men who fired hundreds of shots into the building, set fire to it and then shot three of the four negro occupants as they attempted to escape. The life of Frazier Holmes, 39, was spared because he was so old.

Investigation of the slayings started yesterday when frightened negroes from nearby houses, returned from the woods, in which they had concealed their families, to tell of the raid. The cabin was one of several on the Barnett Blukely ranch, 25 miles from here. The raid was also witnessed by a railroad section crew, who dared not interfere.

Soon after the investigation started, H. B. Crowder Jr., brother of the slain rancher, surrendered to officers and asked protection, saying he feared mob violence. He refused to make a statement or in any way indicate a knowledge of the raid. He was charged with murder and a hearing was set for next week.

Bedbug Case Is Decided by Court

MANCHESTER, Ia., Nov. 12 (AP)—If a bedbug nibbles at your toes or tickles your left ear so you can't sleep, you have a perfect right to break your lease and your landlord can't recover. This was the finding of a jury in district court here yesterday.

It returned a verdict for the defendant in the suit of Jack Billmeyer against Raymond Hoefter to recover 11 months' rent.

Expert testimony on the habits of bedbugs was introduced. One of the witnesses, a woman, said they were docile in the daytime but when they became active at night Colonel Coolidge of French fame had nothing on them.

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DEATH TAKES UNCLE JOE IN DANVILLE

Former Speaker of House Passes on in Old Mansion Today

ELDEST STATESMAN OF THIS NATION

Musty Files of Congressional Records Reveal History of Great Service to America.

DANVILLE, Ill., Nov. 12 (AP)—"Uncle Joe" Cannon died here today at the age of 99.

In the rambling mansion he had built for his bride many years ago, life slowly ebbed away from the old statesman whose iron-handed tactics in congress won him the title of czar of the house back in the days before his fall in 1910.

Died at Noon

On the stroke of 12, at noon today, "Uncle Joe" peacefully breathed his last. He simply slipped away. Time scarcely had touched with silver the thin locks of Joseph Gurney Cannon, 99 years ago, ere the nation had rechristened him "Uncle Joe." And under that title, confirmed by millions who never saw him, yet knew every line of his worn face and every whimsical trait of his intense personality, "Uncle Joe" came at last to end his career as the eldest statesman of the nation; the man of longest service in the congress; the object of honors among his colleagues that took no thought of party or political differences.

Service Began in 1873

In the musty files of the Congressional Record there stands a moving tale of this man's great service. It begins back in 1873 when first he came out of Illinois to take his seat in the house, even then a picturesque
