The wreath was placed at the base of Liberty Memorial amid the cheers of thousands who a few hours earlier had listened to President Coolidge as he dedicated the towering shaft.

Crowning her homage to those who sacrificed their lives in the world war with a plea for world peace, Queen Marie termed the monument a "symbol of peace, a symbol of the great desire of all the world that there should be no more fearful wars to destroy those we love."

Filled with emotion at being the first to lay a wreath at the new memorial, Marie said she did so "in loving remembrance of those for whom it was erected. When I see the wonderful monument that you have built I think of the great sacrifice of all who are not here today to rejoice with us."

MRS. BOTHA CEMENTS UNION

LONGUEVILL, France (AP)—Mrs. Louis Botha, wife of the late General Botha, played the principal part in the unveiling of the Delville Wood Memorial to the South African soldiers who fell in the world war. Her presence meant the temporary burying of the political hatchet between the two opposing parties in South Africa.

It was through General Hertzog, premier of the South African Union, the more prominent political adversary of her late husband, that Mrs. Botha received her invitation. Gifted with a remarkable capacity for politics, Mrs. Botha has always delighted in bringing together conflicting interests and elements and played a great part in the achievement of the "Union of South Africa."

MAY RETURN \$50,000

WASHINGTON, Nov. 12 (AP)—The Spokane, Portland and Seattle railroad may be compelled to return to the government \$50,000 which was received as a guarantee of earnings. The Interstate Commerce commission has certified such calculations to Secretary of the Treasury Mellon, but no formal findings as to the necessity for returning the amount was made. The government now has in court a case involving a similar overpayment to the Northern Pacific, part owner of the Spokane, Portland and Seattle.

NEW INVENTIONS BY WOMEN

LONDON (AP)—Among inventions by women for women shown at the International Exhibition of inventions was a device by which outside of a window may be cleaned inside the room.

Verily was the keynote of the inventions of women who supplied about 20 per cent of the exhibits. One was a wash tub which may be transformed into a wash stand, a work table and a receptacle for cooking. A folding cup, plate and saucer attracted attention.

TIGERS WIN ON ZUNDEL'S 70-YARD RUN

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Pendleton punted from behind her goalposts to Baker who ran the pigskin back to Pendleton's 12-yard line. A forward pass succeeded but a fumble followed the tackle. La Grande recovering on Pendleton's one-yard line. On the second play Snyder crashed through the center of the line for a touchdown. Baker's attempted dropkick for extra point was blocked.

Pendleton Scores Twice

Pendleton's two touchdowns came as a result of steady offense. After a 50-yard gain had been chalked up on a forward pass, Pendleton, from La Grande's 23-yard line, twice was held for no gain. Another pass was intercepted by Price but Referee Fogart called the La Grande back on interference, the penalty giving the oval to the Bucks on the 20-yard line. A left end run netted and a fake line plunge netted 15 yards. Two more thrusts sent the ball over and gave Pendleton first blood. The score remained 7 to 0 until late in the first half when Tubby's first run, made through half a dozen frantic opponents, brought the score up to 7 to 6, where halftime found it.

The second touchdown was the result of a 70-yard march down the field, terminating in a 15-yard gain on a criss-cross. La Grande blocked Pendleton's attempted kick.

Coach Reserves Team's Strength
Coach MacKenzie used probably 20 men of his squad, very few staying in for the entire four periods. With Union to meet tomorrow at 2 p. m. at Union, he was forced to have every bit of strength possible and, as a result of his tactics, the Tigers will be in fair condition for Saturday's contest. The starting lineup was: ends,

Strand and Zundel; tackles, Walker and Berry; guards, Haggan and Ketter; center, Bruce; quarterback, Baker; fullback, Sherwood; halfback, Price and Snyder. Charlton, Stockton, Hanks, Newlin, Lyman, and others played a part of the game, all showing to advantage. Stockton, a recent addition to the squad, gave an exhibition of strength both on the offense and defense from halfback position.

Zundel Stars

Zundel's two long runs entitled him to a lion's share of the praise but every other member of the team came in for a just quota. On the whole, the Tigers defense was spotty, the line at times giving way consistently and at other times presenting a stone wall front. Offense, after making a good gain, a Pendleton back was thrown for a loss on the next play and, with the exception of the 70-yard march down the field, the Bucks at no time could keep up a consistent drive. The Tigers had little trouble in making yardage at times and at other times, the Pendleton line held perfectly. Pendleton made 14 first downs to La Grande's eight.

Everyman in the backfield ripped off several snappy gains. Sherwood, Snyder and Price each advancing the ball many yards, Sullivan probably played the best game for Pendleton.

Much Passing

Both teams resorted to passing and honors were about even in this department although two penalties for interference gave Pendleton some advantage in total yardage gained via the air. Pendleton and La Grande played clean football from start to finish, very few penalties being suffered.

Approximately 1,000 persons saw the game, of which nearly half came from La Grande. Coach Pitts and members of his Union team scouted the game.

The sportsmanship of both rooster sections was excellent. During half time serpentine formations on the gridiron and a number

of Pendleton boys, dressed as girls, staged a humorous football game. Just before the game began a rocket exploded high over the field and an American flag floated over the park while the band played the "Star Spangled Banner."

Frederick Stelwer, United States senator-elect, gave the peace day address before an audience that packed the Rivoli theater to its doors, just after the parade.

"Whether or not we have put an end to war, I feel that a great and lasting step was made in human happiness with the peace of 1918," the new senator said.

"The world disapproved the flagrant doctrine that a solemn treaty was a scrap of paper. There is an obvious willingness to seek relief from the tremendous burdens of

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war. To all these things America is committed. We are not yet united as to the means by which the result is to be accomplished. We are one, however, upon the subject to be obtained. May we hasten the day when the world may be ruled of justice and when war is merely a memory of the past."
