CHAMP CLARK IS PRAISED BY SENATOR REED

BOWLING GREEN, Mo., Nov. 13 (AP)—Champ Clark was the "champion of democracy in the forum of the nation," Senator James K. Reed of Kansas City, declared here this afternoon in an address at the unveiling of a memorial statue to the former speaker of the national house of representatives. "In manners modest, in life simple and unostentatious, unceasingly pursued the path of duty, guided by the light of his brilliant intellect and governed by the mandates of his own conscience. He preferred defeat in a just cause to success in an evil cause and subordinated personal advantage to the general weal. "A soldier upon the battlefields of liberty, his sword struck only in defense of human rights; his shield was the constitution of the United States. His armor the justice of his cause; his weapons the spear of logic, the javelin of satire, the shafts of ridicule and the smile of humor."

Jeff Wyrick, of Fort Wayne, Bids For Demo Presidential Nomination

SALEM, Ore., Nov. 13 (AP)—The question who is going to be the democratic candidate for president in 1928 has been met at post. In a letter received by Carl Donough, secretary of the Oregon democratic committee, Jeff Wyrick, of Fort Wayne, Ind., bids for the nomination. His letter, with liberty taken to edit the spelling follows: To all whom this may concern: "This is to notify you that I, Jeff Wyrick, age 44, born April 7, 1882, three miles south of Oxford, Ind., am using this form to introduce myself to the democrats of each state, as I know, and as all democrats know, that this is one of many ways of placing my name before the great democratic public or body. My deepest wishes are that in the spring of 1928 the democratic party will move as one person in favor of honoring my name, Jeff Wyrick, as their candidate for the final election which will take place in the fall of November of 1928, declaring their candidate Jeff Wyrick, the president of the United States of America. "My platform shall be strictly democratic before and after election whether I am elected or not. "I have never so far in my life been legally elected to any public office, but am using this method to give the party that I represent a chance to elect me in a legal form. "You may direct all personal mail until March 30, 1927, to Jeff Wyrick, Fort Wayne, Ind. After that time and until after the final election you may direct all personal mail to Jeff Wyrick, Dickinson, North Dakota. "With my highest respects to the democratic party, I remain, Yours respectfully, Jeff Wyrick, Fort Wayne, Ind."

Benedictine Fathers Will Restore Historic Abbey on Mt. Angel Butte

MT. ANGEL, Nov. 13—Information has been given out here that the Benedictine Fathers have decided to rebuild St. Benedict's Abbey and the Associated Educational Institutions, which were destroyed in the \$1,000,000 fire September 21, on the beautiful butte, Mt. Angel, where for 25 years the magnificent structures have dominated the picturesque beauty of the surrounding valley. According to the Rt. Rev. Bernard Murphy, O. S. B., Abbot and other reverend fathers, the extent of the immediate construction now depends upon the growth of the Benedictine Relief and Rebuilding fund, since the amount received from insurance money is far too small to reestablish Mt. Angel college as it was before the disaster. Hundreds of thousands of dollars could hardly replace those historic buildings of native gray stone, while the loss suffered in the destruction of libraries and the museum is almost irreparable. A beautiful tradition has undoubtedly played an important part in the decision to rebuild, if possible, on Mt. Angel. As Mr. Robert Horace Down now head of the history department at Franklin high school, Portland, says in his recent "History of the Silverton Country": "On the northern bank (Albion river) stands a lily emerald, some 350 feet in height, formed by the early settlers 'the butte' on whose summit now stands Mt.
