FORTY MILLION MOTOR CARS.

Fears that the automotive industry is overdeveloped are set at rest by a statement from a Chicago expert. "There are more prospective automobile owners in the country today," he says "than there are cars registered. More families can afford two cars today than were able to buy one car 10 years ago." That is probably true. Automobiles are becoming as necessary as bathtubs, and multiplying more rapidly. Back in 1921 the experts thought the "saturation point" was near. There were then about 10,000,000 automobiles in the United States. The number has doubled since. The Chicago man believes the number will double again in the next 15 years. That prospect is enough to keep the manufacturers busy and strain their present facilities before long. The time is approaching, too, when if there were no more growth in the total motor car registration, the industry would be kept fully occupied with the manufacture of spare parts and the replacement of old cars.

AMERICAN COAL FOR EUROPE

Europe is said to be entering her winter season with a coal shortage of 100,000,000 tons. We hope they do not suffer under a severe winter. The English coal strike is responsible. The continent, as well as Great Britain, is starving for coal. The French and German mines cannot make up the deficit. America has been called upon, but too late to provide full relief.

Nations are searching for expedients of many kinds. There are strange projects soberly put forth, such as burning English chalk cliffs, tapping the interior heat of the earth through deep shafts, and following up Sir Oliver Lodge's quest for "atomic power." Only the first of these could be done immediately, and it is not very practical. Waterpower and tide-power may provide relief only in the distant future.

Coal can be brought from China, where there are ample supplies in the ground, but not much this winter. The Chinese themselves lack available coal. There will be serious inroads made into European forests. Millions of trees that should be kept for lumber will be sacrificed for fuel.

American coal mines at present offer most hope. Europe's extremity is America's opportunity, as it has been more than once in the past. Our eastern and middle-western soft coal fields are prospering, for the first time in years. Mines are operating full time and wages are rising, as thousands of train loads move to tidewater for ocean shipment.

And all because a few leaders of men in England cannot agree about the adjustment of wages and profits in a single, centralized, local industry. America, while profiting by European blunders, will do well to guard against a similar blunder of her own, next year, when the miners' agreement expires.

GUARDSMEN WIN FROM BAKER '11' WITH EASE 27-6

Lone Touchdown for Visitors Result of a Fumble and Long Run.

The La Grande national guard football team decisively defeated the Baker guardsmen here yesterday afternoon, winning a one-sided contest 27 to 6. Baker's only touchdown was the result of McCord picking up a fumble and racing 60 yards to La Grande's goal line in the third quarter.

La Grande started scoring in the second quarter when Bob Garly and Grant Conley each took the ball over. Sherwood kicked goal after one touchdown, the half ending 13 to 0.

Sherwood Scores Touchdown
In the third quarter, Baker resorted to forward passes and Sherwood picked one out of the air and ran 45 yards for the third score. He kicked goal, making the total 20 to 0. Shortly afterward McCord made Baker's lone score.

Later in the third period Tige Larsen carried the ball over around right end after a series of plays, in which Larsen figured strongly, advanced the ball from about midfield. Sherwood again converted.

The fourth quarter was scoreless with Baker starting a comeback. Twice the La Grande team drove down to within the shadow of Baker's goal posts and two times were unable to punch through the opposing line.

The game ended with Baker in possession of the ball near midfield, frantically attempting to score by use of forward passes, of which only a few were completed. A large crowd, probably 750, witnessed the game.

La Grande's team, although lacking practice, was one of the strongest seen on a local gridiron in many years. R. Garly, Larsen, Sherwood, Walbridge, J. Garly were among the backfield men and in the line, Conley, Jack Wright, Dee Smith, Allstott, Woodell, Knudt, E. Metcalf, G. Metcalf, Bud Newlin and others made the playing game practically impossible for Baker backs.

Reider and Layne, Baker backfield men, showed up well in returning punts and kickoffs, and the Baker line played a strong game. Glindeman, high school coach, was in the signal-calling role.

As a result of yesterday's game, La Grande guardsmen have a claim to the championship of the second battalion, 184th Infantry. Baker also defeated Boise guardsmen a while back 21 to 0, which might give La Grande an interstate title, providing no games are lost this year.

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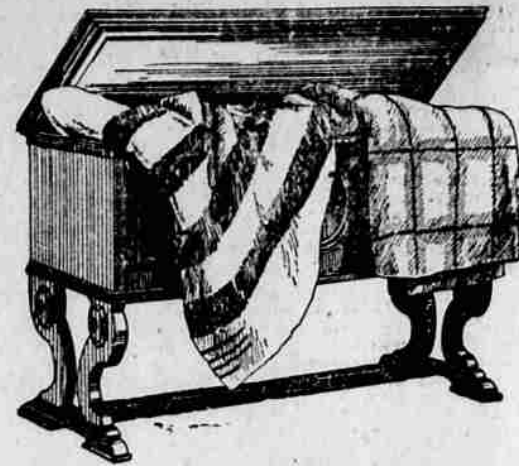

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Crescent Lake Will Be Newest Town in Oregon

PORTLAND, Ore., Nov. 5 (AP)—Details are being worked out today for a new Oregon town to be called Crescent Lake. It is a division point on the new Cascade division of the Southern Pacific high in the mountains and about a half mile from Crescent Lake. It is in the Deschutes national forest.

Twenty applications for the purchase of business lots in the town were brought to the office of C. J. Buck, assistant district forester in charge of lands today by R. J.

Fromme, supervisor of the Deschutes.

They are working out the procedure necessary to set aside the townsite.

The railroad company has already erected a 22-room hotel for its men there and about 20 families are on the ground. Some are putting up homes. The applications are for stores, pool halls and garages.

The Southern Pacific operates 27 trains a day through the town. A round house and Y have been built. The government has already surveyed the townsite.
