UNCLE JOE LAID TO REST TODAY

DANVILLE, Ill., Nov. 16 (AP)—Par from the halls of state, where Joseph Guernsey Cannon wrote his name indelibly into the history of a nation, friends of the former speaker of the house-conferred today to commit his body to its resting place.

Under a wintry sky, only a score of men of state and a few flags in the church gave token that the rites honored a man who served more years in the nation's congress than any other, and who for eight years ruled that body with a mastery it never has known since.

Less than an hour of obsequies marked the services at the church and the grave. A hymn, a prayer and a five minute talk by the Rev. T. N. Ewing, of the St. James Methodist church, to which Uncle Joe belonged, constituted the church ceremony, and at the cemetery Knights Templars and Boy Scouts stood at attention as the casket passed between them and was lowered to the grave.

Vice President Charles G. Dawes, Governor Len Small of Illinois, Senator Charles S. Deneen and others who arose to political prominence during Cannon's public life stood with the throngs who packed the church, but there was no other flavor of official tribute at the family's request.

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3 Convicts Escape From Folsom Prison

FOLSOM STATE PRISON, Cal., Nov. 16, (AP)—Another man hunt is being extended into Northern California today as the result of the disappearance yesterday of three desperate convicts at the Folsom state prison. While awaiting some tangible clue to cause a ceasing of searching forces, the prison authorities are following two plans of action. First, the caverns without the prison grounds are being watched every moment. The secondary plan is to scatter guards through the surrounding country and to station them at smaller towns out of Sacramento. The warden's office expresses confidence that the men are hid out. The missing convicts are: Leg Brennan, alias Brannan, William "Buck" O'Brien alias "Red" O'Brien, alias Burns and Thomas Griffin, alias Tom Goff, and known to the underworld as "the owl."

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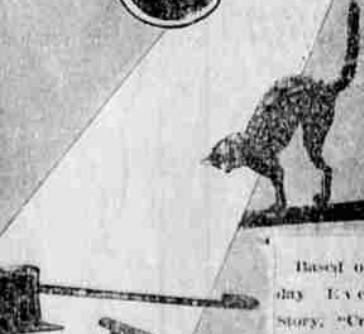
