

MARRIED DUKE; LOVED ANOTHER

Consuelo Vanderbilt Was
Threatened by Her
Mother Is Report

LONDON, Nov. 16 (AP).—The love of Consuelo Vanderbilt for a young American when she married the Duke of Marlborough 21 years ago is among the latest revelations as to the cause of the annulment by the Catholic church of her marriage to the duke.

A despatch to the Daily Mail from Rome says that a part of the evidence presented to the diocesan court consisted of letters to her from a young American whom she would have married had her mother not prevailed against her.

Her mother, then Mrs. W. K. Vanderbilt, is now Mrs. O. H. P. Belmont.

Threats Confirmed
That the mother's "commands, threats and importunities" induced the 17-year-old heiress to abandon her American sweetheart for "an splendid marriage" is said unofficially to have been confirmed before the Catholic diocesan court at Southwark, which granted the annulment.

It is said that the confirmation was given to the court by Mrs. Belmont and other witnesses. Official secrecy in this respect, however, is still being maintained by the church authorities whose decision to annul the marriage was upheld by the holy rota tribunal in Rome.

The latest version of the genesis of the proceeding attributes them to Consuelo's wish to regularize her marriage with Colonel Jacques Balsan, a French Catholic in the eyes of the Catholic church by having the ceremony performed in accordance with Roman rites. This would have been impossible while she retained the position of a divorcee. Since her marriage to Marlborough has been nullified Consuelo's marriage to her French husband has been feasible but it is not known whether a new ceremony has been celebrated.

Question Not Answered
The question of the duke's alleged desire to enter the Roman church has not been answered officially. Catholic authorities say positively that he has not been accepted as a communicant, but they decline to confirm or deny a statement that he has applied for admission to the church.

'Installment Plan' Causes Most Divorces; Drink and Cruelty Next

CHICAGO, Nov. 16 (AP).—The age old picture of the mother-in-law as a cause of domestic war is all wrong, concludes Charles E. Eberstein, who cites a record of his divorce cases to prove that the mother-in-law angle entered into so few as to be almost negligible.
Out of 1,772 divorce cases in which he has appeared as counsel only six could be attributed to mothers-in-law, said the attorney, who gave as the most prolific cause of legal separation "the light oak piano or the purple plush chair in the parlor"—mean "installment plan" buying of furniture.
Drink, Cruelty Second
"In my experience I have always found mothers-in-law eager and willing to smooth out the domestic differences of their children," writes Mr. Eberstein in his new book "The Show-Up."
The attorney lists the causes leading to divorce as follows: "Installment plan," 656; drink and cruelty, 341; cabarets and dance halls, 178; cooking, 127; vamps (both sexes), 122; success to husbands, 114; court of domestic relations, 85; stage ambitions, 52; lack of children, 21; traveling jobs, 16; mothers-in-law, 6; miscellaneous, 4.
"The great American 'installment plan' makes marriage easy in contemplation, at least—and it makes divorce expedient," he declared. "The broad item 'installment plan' may cover divorce cases which apparently come through drink, other women or other men, cabarets or the like, but hunted to its real source, the real reason is revealed in the 'installment plan' furniture."
Live Above Means
"The engagement ring, purchased 'so much down and so much a week' to show the other girl in the store or in the neighborhood has lured thousands of young couples into the sea of matrimony on the flimsy raft of 'easy payments,' only to wreck them on the hidden shoals of bankruptcy and divorce."
"It also strikes the married pair of more substantial means who find the easiest way to hold their heads among neighbors, are charge accounts and visits to the loan shark. Higher in the financial scale, it reaches its tentacles into the homes where the husband and wife already are mortgaged, but where the pumpered wife 'just can't see why' her husband cannot afford to buy her a new town car with more fashionable upholstery."
