'BOHEMIAN GIRL' CHORUS SCORES

Large Crowd Attends May Valentine's Offering at the Arcade

A REVIEW All but a few seats were filled at the Arcade theater last night when a five-piece sample of May Valentine's symphony orchestra—the "Bohemian Girl" chorus—struck up the familiar melody of "The Bohemian Girl."

Flashing the pale-blonde hair of Bohemian lass, the chorus, back and forth vibrated exhilaratingly to the glad, mad music of the hour, the ATTES sang the carnival and the American court. Beside the simulated chattering of the chorus, the principals fell into second place, few of them vocally or dramatically equipped to lend their own against the tambourine-jangling choristers.

The acting was superficial. But who could recall a grand opera separate super whose dramatic attempts invariably floundered in "type-molded" What though there was a riotous lack of unity in setting that "mood" was mixed rather than blended?

Let Count Arban play high tragedy. His wooden, soldier-like stride, and the overly solemn something that suggested little bits in "The Tenth Muse." Was it all opera? And have we not always encouraged individuality in opera performance?

From the heading party to the presentation, in the final act scene, May Valentine's production was a joy to see, and a good deal of the time, it was equally pleasurable to hear.

Not the least of its first-act interest centered around the new La Grande actress, Jean Davies, who smiled and the spotlight into the hearts of the audience, as though she had been stepping the boards for years instead of making her first untroubled appearance.

Two Numbers Score Two of the trio of most popular acts from "The Bohemian Girl" scored high spots in the entertainment. The first was "I Dream I See It in Martin Hall," sung by Arban and her sweetheart of Melodrama fame. The other was "The Song of the Eagle," sung by the trio. "Then You'll Remember Me," Long familiar, but as well received as the former two. "The Song of the Eagle" was a new number. The Gypsy queen was voiced after her dramatic contralto rendition of "Silent Forever Flax," "Devilhood" will have very good volume for the latest beautiful comedy.

But it was from first to last a night bristling to chorus. And in the second act scene, it reached its climax.

MASONS ASK CHARTER

Farm Pointers

Plugging up and burning infected strawberry plants is the only known way for control of the weevil, says the Oregon experiment station. Old heavily infested plants are considered a nuisance to new plantings and if they are near the new plants are best pulled up and burned.

Control of winter injury in apple and pear orchards consists chiefly in such practices as: (1) covering the trees with dormant spray in the fall, (2) using the experiment station's "winter water" in applied liberally in winter, (3) using a cover crop in August and some of the practices.

Edematism and blackleg are the two potato diseases found in Oregon, which are sometimes confused with wilt, says the experiment station. Edematism usually shows as yellow, dead, water-soaked spots in lower ground surface areas, with normal looking interior parts. Blackleg shows as an ink black decay of the main stalk.

Legion Planning Midnight Matinee For New Year Eve

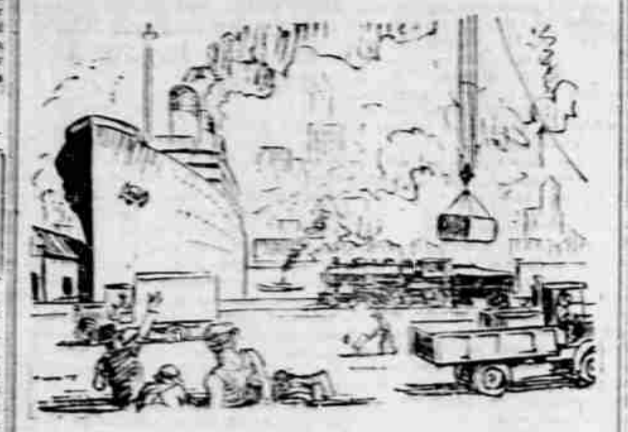
The all-around wrestler which many outdoors are betting in a 175-mile long run had an oil and fuel mile average of 1.2 cents a mile.
