WEBFOOTERS ARE READY FOR TILT

Oregon Team Expects to Give Aggies Big Surprise Saturday.

EUGENE, Ore., Nov. 18 (AP)—The University of Oregon football team is ready. The Oregon Aggie cultural college stars will be given a work-out Saturday that they won't forget for some time to come.

This was the opinion last night of Coach John J. McEwan, of the Oregon squad, following the work-out of the team.

The ghost ball was brought into play, again last night, and the gridmen were putting through their paces long after the rays of the setting sun had settled over the horizon.

Oregon Hopeful

The Oregon men have no misgivings as to the coming contest. They are eager for the day of the big game, and are confident of handling out a whopping big surprise to the Aggies, who are conceded a 12 to 14-point advantage to everyone but the Oregon men.

Ira Woodie, heady quarter, will, in all probability not be in the Oregon lineup. His place will be taken by Munnigh. Lynn Jones will be back at full with George Burnell and Victor Wetzel at halves.

Tricks up Sleeve

The team is at the highest emotional point reached this season. Growing indications of favorable weather for the game has led Coach McEwan to rehearse his men some more on the bag of trick plays for dry field play. They have not overlooked the wet field possibilities either.

A rally is planned for Friday night here and close to 2,000 Oregon students are expected to be in Corvallis for the game.

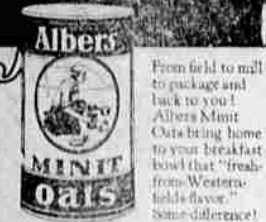
CORVALLIS, Ore., Nov. 18 (AP)—Final practice scrimmage of the season for the Oregon Aggies has been ordered for tonight by Coach Schuster, who will then "rest the case" for the game with University of Oregon Saturday and the intercollegiate game with Marquette on Thanksgiving.

The coach was much better pleased with the showing of his men last night than earlier this week. Main last night dampened hopes for a dry field Saturday but firm footing still is possible if the weather clears up, as Bell Field is one of the best drained grids in the northwest.

The games Saturday and Thanksgiving will be the last for 18 members of the Aggie team. Coach Schuster will lose his entire first string with the exception of Maple at quarter, Logan at end, and Ellers at guard. The veterans who will graduate are Wes Schuster, Merle, Web Edwards, Ken Demman, Slim Batoon, Knout Wornmark, Jim Dixon, Hippo Dickerson, Hal Ward, Glen Ohmstead, Mike Olander, Ed Jarvis, Hal Liebe and Hale.

Book Company to Fight Changes

SALEM, Ore., Nov. 18 (AP)—Saulborn and company, publishers, have employed P. J. Gallagher, a Portland attorney, to contest adoption of text books made here last Monday by the state text book commission. "This book," known here yesterday, but the grounds for the action were not made known. The commission redrafted the texts of four subjects, but changes were made in all others considered. Changes or readoptions are made every two years in one-third of the books used in Oregon schools.

EUGENE, Ore., Nov. 18 (AP)—Byron O'Connor, Eugene high school football player, around whom controversy as to eligibility has raged during the past week has established legal guardianship with his sister, Mrs. Rose Gnske. A court order was made yesterday establishing the guardianship. MEDFORD, Ore., Nov. 18 (AP)—The Medford high school football team composed of 19 players left this morning for Eugene where they will play Eugene high school tomorrow afternoon. Coach Carlson expressed regret that two of Eugene's mainstays had been declared ineligible. A crowd of 250 rooters will follow the team and see the Oregon-O. A. C. game at Corvallis Saturday.

Homecoming of Aggies Nearing; Game Big Event

OREGON AGRICULTURAL COLLEGE, Corvallis, Nov. 18—The thirty-first annual football game between U. of O. and O. A. C. will be the feature of the homecoming at O. A. C. this year. Advance ticket sales give every indication of the largest campus game crowd in history.

During the game and homecoming dance that is to follow, the Home Economic's club will maintain a survey in the men's gymnasium so mothers may enjoy the events and feel that their children are well cared for.

Other features of the program are the rock band Friday night, preceded by the pajama and noise parade. The Phi Kappa Phi, national scholastic honorary, will hold its annual breakfast and initiation Sunday morning.

More than 6000 letters have been sent to the alumni asking them to return for the program. Official cars will be available to carry alumni about the campus, and to and from the trains.

Pathe news, the Oregonian screen review, and Webfoot Weekly will take movies of the events and KQAT will broadcast the play by play account of the game and the other features of the program.

The annual alumni dance will be for ex-O. A. C. students only. Two student body dances will be at the same time to accommodate students.

Planned Escape By "Dummy" Gun

YAKIMA, Wash.—Plans of William H. Patterson, automobile thief, age 22, to overpower his guard en route to the penitentiary, by using a dummy revolver and wooden dagger, and make his escape, instead of serving his five to 15 years sentence, blew up when John G. Buscko, prison traveling guard, "frisked" Patterson at the Yakima county jail and took from him the clothing the false "45" and bowie. Patterson cursed when he saw that his plans were revealed. He left soon afterward for Walla Walla, crestfallen and ailing.

With Patterson went Ward E. Archer, who shot and seriously wounded his wife, Josephine Archer August 22. He will serve 15 to 25 years. W. H. Saunders, sentenced to five to 15 years for grand larceny, and John Green, Patterson's "weapons" gave evidence of many hours of patient labor since he was placed in jail here last July charged with theft.

CROSS-COUNTRY RUN

EUGENE, Ore., Nov. 18 (AP)—A cross-country run between teams of the University of Oregon and the Oregon Agricultural college will be staged at Corvallis Saturday, just before the football game between the two institutions. The race will start at 1 o'clock. Twenty runners will be entered by each institution. The final score will be determined on a percentage basis.

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Will Fight N. P. Reduction of Tax

SPOKANE, Wash.—Prosecuting attorneys from many parts of the state met here recently to outline their plans for opposing the \$41,000,000 tax reduction suit brought by the Northern Pacific railroad.

A motion will be argued here Nov. 22 when the attorneys will attempt to show that the railroad, which has started the suit in federal court, has not filed it in a court having jurisdiction in such matters.

The prosecutors from each county through which the railroad passes are appearing. Assistant Attorney General H. G. Sharpe of Olympia was here yesterday to meet with the prosecutors. Deputy Prosecutor A. O. Colburn is in charge for Spokane county, W. L. LaPointe for Whitman county, R. M. Sturdevant, Columbia county, and A. J. Gillis, Walla Walla were the prosecutors from Eastern Washington at the conference. G. E. Clark appeared for Yakima county.

CONDITION EXCHANGED

EUGENE, Ore., Nov. 18. (AP)—The condition of Donald McDonald, injured yesterday in an automobile accident, remains practically unchanged this morning, according to word from the hospital where he was taken.

McDonald's skull is fractured, and he is not expected to regain consciousness for two or three days, attending physicians state.

Mrs. McDonald was fatally injured in the accident. She died half an hour after being rushed to the hospital.
