Castles go up in smoke at Metro-Goldwyn-Mayer's Culver City studio. Sets that once appeared as gay cafe scenes, a castle on the Rhine, and the "bed of roses" in "Three Weeks," were burned as waste material in the furnace that heats the studio boilers.

Gloria Swanson, John Barrymore and Buster Keaton, are completing their first independent production. Miss Swanson is well advanced in her work on "Sunset" at the New York studio. Barrymore has another month's "shooting" scheduled on "The Beloved Rogue" at Hollywood and Keaton is cutting and titling "The General," also in Hollywood.
