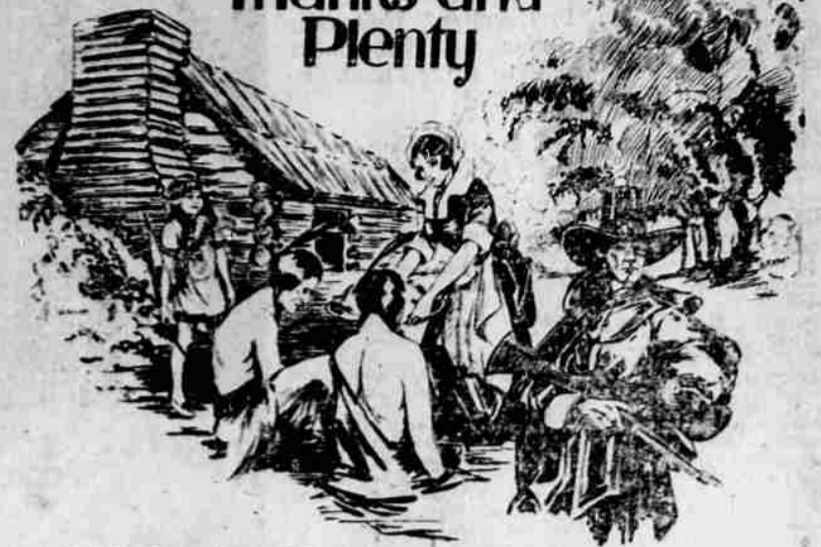

HARD GAME DUE IN WALLA WALLA

Blue Devils and Tigers About Evenly Matched, Comparisons Show

La Grande, which until 1924 had played an interstate football game for many years, Saturday gave its third such contest in the last three seasons. The games in 24 and 1925, with Boise, Ida., were both lost, one by the score 7 to 6 and the other 14 to 8. Tomorrow the Tigers will invade Walla Walla, the lair of the Blue Devils, eager to win from the other grid crew. On comparative scores the Washington team led an edge over the La Grande team. Walla Walla's record to date follows:

Wa-Hi, however, has a heavier team tonight.

Stanford Given 5 to 1 Odds by Coast Gamblers

SAN FRANCISCO, Nov. 19 (AP)—The surge of Pacific coast conference football toward the end of the hectic 1925 season tomorrow brings six eleven into action in three games along the western seaboard.

Of these, the most interest centers at Berkeley where the undefeated Oregon Agricultural college crush tomorrow in Corvallis. So far it looks as though the diminutive scrapper would view the contest from the bench.

Merril Hagen, former Roosevelt high school captain in the Portland interscholastic league, will in all probability start the game at quarter. With the exception of Woodie, the Oregon men are in good condition for the game.

At least 2,000 Oregon fans are expected to make the trip to Corvallis to see the annual classic between the ancient rivals.

Stanford Cardinals clash with California's Golden Bears in the annual "big game". Four times defeated in conference encounters, California followers hold out but small hopes of victory. How the chances for a win appear to the betting element are told in odds of 2 to 1 on Stanford.

Aggies Play Oregon
At Corvallis, Oregon and the Oregon Aggies meet in their annual state classic. The Farmers with but one loss this season, are favored to run through the ranks of their rivals comparatively easy.

Idaho invades Los Angeles for a brawl with the speedy University of Southern California Trojans but is not expected to get far with the squad that last week downed the powerful Oregon Aggies.

Pacific university and the College of Puget Sound battle at Tacoma for the championship of the northwest conference. Games today bring Montana and the California Aggies together at Sacramento while the undefeated St. Mary's team enters its attack against Fresno State college at Fresno. The Montana eleven is en route to Los Angeles to play University of Southern California Thanksgiving day, in the last coast conference engagement.
