TILLAMOOK CLUB WOMAN ON TRIAL

Mrs. Eva McGee Accused of Murder in Opening Statement to Jury

TILLAMOOK, Ore., Nov. 19 (AP)—Mrs. Eva McGee, business club and church woman of this city, today heard herself accused of the murder of her husband, Dr. W. G. McGee, when District Attorney Claude W. Barrick made his opening statement to the jury in her trial before Judge George R. Barclay. Charges by the prosecution summarized, were:

That the state would show that up to Aug. 10, 1926, Dr. McGee had so far recovered from injuries sustained in an automobile accident that he was preparing to resume his medical practice at Nehalem.

That Dr. McGee had left the hospital and returned to the Netherlands hotel, owned jointly by himself and wife, to complete convalescence.

That Mrs. McGee about this time purchased at a drug store one dram of a poison which she told her husband was for rats, but which she buried in a stove when Dr. McGee remonstrated with her, saying it was too dangerous to have about when there were two children in the home.

That Mrs. McGee, unknown to her husband, the following day went to a different drug store and purchased another dram of the poison.

That three insurance policies were transferred to make Mrs. McGee sole beneficiary. One of them had been made out in favor of Dr. McGee's estate, one for \$1,000 in favor of their son Donald, and one for a similar amount in favor of their adopted daughter, Mrs. Catherine Travis of Coquille. The state contends the total was about \$10,000. That these changes in beneficiary bore the name of Dr. McGee as signatory.

That Dr. McGee did not sign the documents himself.

That Dr. McGee was in apparent good health on Aug. 9.

That Dr. McGee was seized with violent convulsions on Aug. 10.

That Dr. McGee complained of the bitter taste of the medicine prescribed by Dr. Hoads, when the medicine prescribed had a sweet taste.

That Dr. McGee's actions during his last hours indicated poisoning.

That Mrs. McGee displayed unbecomingly haste in disposing of the body and ordering it removed from the state for burial.

Finally that there was proof that Dr. McGee had received poison and that he did not take it himself.

M. L. Holland, of defense counsel, had just started his opening statement to combat that of this state when recess was taken.

PORT ANGELES, Wash., Nov. 19 (AP)—Prosecutor Wilson, arguing for the state here today in the trial of Dr. Paul D. Moore, concluded in an hour and a half. W. J. Conniff, of Port Angeles, then opened for the defense.

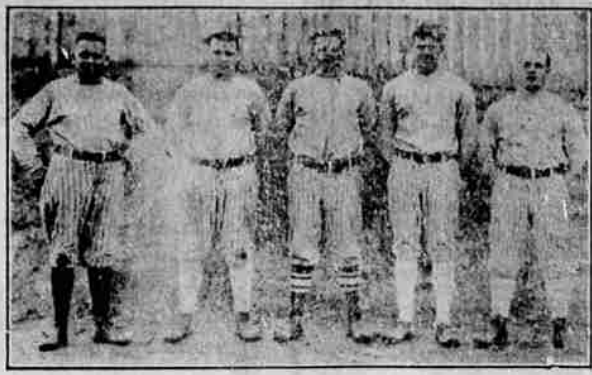
Wilson asserted the evidence showed that Moore, accused of killing his wife with poison July 29, had predicted accurately the date of her death, 39 days before she passed. He mentioned expert testimony that poison was found in Mrs. Moore's stomach and kidneys.

dard's expert, Charles Walte, was to have testified for the state in this phase of its case, but he died last Sunday.

The defense accepted Goddard as an expert without question but there was a clash when Simpson attempted to introduce pictures which Goddard said Walte had made of the bullets taken from the head of Mrs. Mills.

"In defense of these innocent people," said Simpson, pointing to Mrs. Hall and her two brothers, "their counsel objects to introduction of photographs of these bullets. Walte is dead, and I cannot produce him, but Detective Tuffin will swear that he received the bullets from Hageman, who made the autopsy and gave them to Walte."

"Walte's partner is here to testify."

During the argument, the paste board box of clothes worn by the victims the night their bodies were found beneath the crab apple tree were brought into court.

Goddard said that a microscopic study of the three bullets from Mrs. Mills' head showed that they

were fired from the same gun.

Concerning the photographs, the witness said that Walte had told him that they were photographs of three bullets. The defense still objected to their admission on the grounds that they have any connection with the case and Judge Parker upheld him, although allowing the photographs to be marked pending future proof by the state that they are photographs of the death bullets. One of the greatest difficulties the prosecution has had in getting its evidence admitted has been created by the bullets and the shells.

Pendleton Man Dies of Exposure

PENDLETON, Ore., Nov. 19, (AP)—Ray Bartley, 26, of Pendleton, died from exposure and collapse while trapping with a companion in the brush of the Walla Walla river yesterday. His parents, who live here, were notified by the young man's companion, who walked 20 miles to the nearest telephone. A storm caught the two men as they were returning to camp after setting traps, and Bartley was noticed to have been back and seemed weary. His friend made a fire but in a short time Bartley was dead.

\$1,200; Riveria buildings and grounds, \$1,200; Willow building and grounds, \$1,000.

Municipal assessments for streets, etc., are estimated at \$2,000.

Pay Indebtedness. Of indebtedness to be paid, \$10,000 is allowed for retirement of bonds; \$9,550 for interest on bonds, and \$300 for interest on borrowed money.

One hundred fifty dollars is set aside for fire insurance premiums. Of miscellaneous items there are the premium's clerk's bond, \$50; crippled children's fund, \$60; audit of clerk's books, \$10, and general, \$4,000, making a total of \$4,150.

Publishing of the budget is estimated at \$100 under emergencies.

Of the estimated receipts, not including the proposed tax, there are four sources: The county school fund, \$22,920.70; state school fund, \$2,531; elementary school fund, \$14,044.75; and funds from other sources, \$9,958.93.

The indebtedness of this district, it is attested by Colon R. Eberhard, chairman of the board of directors, comprises only the bonded indebtedness amounting to \$175,900.

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RAIN AT KLAMATH

KLAMATH FALLS, Ore., Nov. 19 (AP)—Uninterrupted rainfall here the past three days has brought 2.5 inches of rain to parched valleys where previously no moisture had fallen in months. Slightly more than an inch has fallen here since last evening at 4 o'clock. Telephonic connection with Crater Lake Lodge disclosed that a warm rain was falling at the lake rim, where there is now a little less than two feet of snow. Last night the temperature at the rim was only three degrees below freezing, according to the caretaker. There is no snow at the summit of the Cascades, at Pinhurst, on the Ashland-Klamath Falls highway, and none at the summit of Sand Creek hill, on the Dalles-California highway.
