CARE OF THE NEW MOTHER

In the early ages of the human race, there was little necessity for special care of the new mother, for that was before our present type of struggles for existence and the spread of disease. But now the very manner of living and the customs of our people are constantly changing, the natural growth and functions of the body become complex, and child-bearing ceases to be a normal function as intended by our Maker.

Hence, we must insist upon our young mothers using care and precaution not only before but at the time of birth and afterward.

Remember the mother had been nine months maturing this child and at the end passed through several hours of rather severe pain, all of which has its effect upon her physical condition. Now, since the baby is here she must conserve her

strength in order to nourish it.

This means that she must have complete rest of mind and body for several weeks. Any undue excitement or mental stress will change the quantity and quality of the milk and the baby will not thrive. Over exercise will do the same thing and at the same time cause the mother to be a nervous wreck.

After the child is born the mother should remain in bed about two weeks, beginning to sit up on the twelfth day and to walk on the fourteenth, so at the end of the third week she will be walking around the house.

She should not lie upon her back continuously as mothers used to do; but turn upon both sides and after ten days assume the knee chest posture for ten minutes night and morning.

After three weeks, in normal cases, a tub bath may be safely indulged in. Up to this time a sponge or shower bath only is allowed.

Short automobile rides may be taken after three weeks; and not until the end of the fourth week should she be allowed to go up and down stairs. At the end of six

weeks is the final examination.

Any lacerations or displacements are found and treatment instituted at this time. The necessary care will not only prevent future operations, but cancer, for many cancers begin after childbirth.

The first six weeks, of course, are the most important, but a certain amount of care is necessary for a year. Always get the best doctor available and do as he advises.

Sister Mary Says:

BREAKFAST—Baked apples, oatmeal, thin cream, fried cornmeal mush with brown sugar syrup, milk, coffee.

LUNCHEON—Hungarian potatoes, apple-celery-nut salad, bran bread, cranberry and rice pudding, milk, tea.

DINNER—Mutton chops, boiled potatoes in parsley-butter, kohl rabi in golden sauce, jellied mint salad, orange cream pudding with coconut meringue, whole wheat bread, milk, coffee.

In this dinner menu the salad serves a two-fold purpose—it's a delicious salad and an ideal accompaniment for the chops.

Cocoanut added to almost any meringue baked on a pudding is a delightful change but with an orange custard or cream pudding the combination is quite perfect. The food value of the dish is also appreciably increased.

Hungarian Potatoes
Three cups potato cubes, 2 onions, 3 tablespoons bacon fat or butter, 3/4 teaspoon salt, 1/2 teaspoon paprika, 1/2 teaspoon pepper, 3 cups boiling water.

Melt fat in kettle. Add onions thinly sliced and simmer five minutes, taking care that the onions do not brown. Add remaining ingredients and simmer until potatoes are tender but not broken. The water cooks away so that the dish is not "soupy." The paprika makes the potatoes quite pink in color but does not greatly change their flavor.
