parents and teachers in the Indian tongue, which was interpreted by his son, William, graduate of Haskell institute, of Lawrence, Kan.

The Indian leader expressed his happiness in being asked to appear on the program, and told how the Indians years ago trained their children not to steal and lie, not to be lazy and to honor their parents, telling them that if they followed these ideals their lives would be successful.

Recalls Indian Festival
Before the Grande Ronde valley was settled in the fall of the year the various Indian tribes came together here for a festival. It was then that the "Old Man" of the tribe talked to the boys and young men, instructing them especially to observe the seventh day, when the Great Spirit was worshiped. Ordinarily the boys of the tribe were given special instructions and sometimes the willow was used, the Indian leader said.

Still Visits Campground
The meeting place was along the Grande Ronde river between the Eckley and Anderson places. Mr. Probstel, the grandfather of Victor Eckley, gave as his dying request that this grove be open as a campground for the Indians as long as they wanted to come there. Each year this little group returns to this spot for a short stay.

In closing his talk he said "We are now one group of people in the same country, under the same flag. We are living under the United States flag and considered as one. I have never gone to school, but speak as I feel, saying what I think is right. I am glad to be put on the program, glad to say a few words before Thanksgiving day. That is all."

Gilbert Minthorn knows many legends about the Grande Ronde valley, which are being interpreted into English by his son and will be made into a book.

Because the time was limited the Indians promised to return again when they said they would tell many interesting stories concerning La Grande and the Grande Ronde valley.

INCREASE WAGES OF U. P. EMPLOYEES

OMAHA, Nov. 20 (AP)—Increase of pay for 14,000 Union Pacific employees was announced here today.

Twelve thousand shop employees and 2,000 miscellaneous workers, including mostly maintenance workers, linemen, mechanics, and helpers will share in the raise which will not exceed the rate of two cents an hour. The shopmen will get their increase effective Dec. 1. Other employees raises will start Jan. 1.

The increase is the result of increased output of the employees, said G. H. Shook, assistant to the vice president in charge of operation.

Attorney General Plans No Action
SALISBURY, Nov. 20 (AP)—The attorney general's office does not contemplate legal action to test the title to the Ross Island group, Attorney General Van Winkle declared today.

"In view of the fact that there has appeared in the press articles conveying the impression that the attorney general's office contemplates legal action to test the title of the Ross Island Sand and Gravel company to properties acquired from John Kiernan, comprising the Ross Island Group of islands in the Willamette river, I want to state that this office has never, and does not now question the title of the company to them," said Van Winkle.

"The question has arisen as to the exact location of the low water line of these islands and the state engineers office is making a survey to determine this line. This does not involve any controversy with the Ross Island Sand and Gravel company, but on the contrary we have had its cooperation in the matter."

"In conclusion I wish to add that this office does not wish to be involved in any way in any sand and gravel controversy, fancied or real, between the opposing sand and gravel interests."

MRS. R. ZWEIFEL CALLED 'BEYOND'

Wife of Local Business Man Dies After Three Weeks' Illness

Mrs. Elora Beecher Zweifel, 34, wife of Reuben Zweifel, and a prominent figure in the outdoor and sports activities of this community, died at the Grande Ronde hospital at 10:30 o'clock last evening. Death followed three weeks of critical illness, during which she underwent two operations.

Mrs. Zweifel, who for the last seven years had been employed as a traveling clerk at the freight office of the O. W. R. & N. company in this division, was recognized as one of the keenest sportswomen of this section. She competed successfully in both hunting and fishing contests, and established successive records as the first angler to display her catch the morning that the season opened.

Born at Enterprise June 21, 1892, Elora Beecher received her early schooling there, later coming to La Grande, where for two years she was a student at the Sacred Heart academy.

About three years ago, after employment with the railroad company in other parts on this division, she returned to La Grande, and had made her home here since.

Besides the widowed husband, a 10-year-old son, Harry Zweifel, survives the decedent in La Grande, along with her relatives surviving are the father, H. W. Beecher, two brothers, Lawson and Oral Beecher, and five sisters, Mrs. A. E. Davis and Mrs. S. L. Davis, all of Enterprise; Mrs. August Mathieu and Mrs. Charles Atanley, at Joseph, and Mrs. Charles Cowles, at Portland.

Brief funeral services will be conducted at the Bohnekamp chapel by the Rev. Father Nooy, pastor of Our Lady of the Valley church, at 9 o'clock Monday morning. The body will be taken to Enterprise for burial. Services will be held there at 2 o'clock in the afternoon, with the Rev. Father Edward Kelly, pastor of the Enterprise Catholic church, officiating.

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Blaine County Finds Turks Pay Farmers Profits

HAILEY, Ida., Nov. 20.—The turkey growing industry in Blaine county has made important advances during the past year and plans for additional advances for the coming year are already well under way, County Agriculture Agent T. J. Klinger declares.

"Blaine county is proud of its turkeys," said Mr. Klinger "and for good reason. Last year we brought in 88 bronze turkey turkeys from the very best flocks we could find and distributed them among 48 individual growers in the county. This year the average weight of the individual bird was about 5.6 pounds more in the Thanksgiving shipment than the average weight at the same shipment last year, and we only had one-fourth the number of culls that we had last year. The building up of the breeding stock and educating the growers in the best methods of handling turkeys are having their effect and we are making the turkey industry in Blaine county one of the most profitable phases of the farm."

The Blaine county members of the Southern Idaho Turkey Growers' association will have a car and a half of turkeys ready for the Christmas shipment, declared Mr. Klinger.

"The majority of our birds were not ready for the market when we shipped the Thanksgiving pool and rather than sell them in other than first class condition, the growers are holding them for the holidays," the county agent said.

RAIN, SNOW HERE

MEDFORD RAIN HEAVY
MEDFORD, Ore., Nov. 20 (AP)—All records for continuous rain-fall in Medford since the establishment of the local weather bureau were broken today when the total precipitation in the last 24 hours 2.80 inches. For 24 hours the rain hardly ceased. Today the clouds are breaking and the sun shining intermittently but the weather bureau predicts more rain for tonight and tomorrow.

SNOW IN PENDLETON
PENDLETON, Ore., Nov. 20 (AP)—Pendletonians arose this morning to be greeted by a blanket of snow an inch and a quarter thick. There is little likelihood of its remaining throughout the day unless a sudden turn toward colder weather sets in. Slush is already forming on the streets.

RAIN AIDS MINERS
GIANTS PASS, Ore., Nov. 20 (AP)—Placer mining operations in Josephine county were put under way this week with the longest continued downpour of the fall and winter. Until 10 days ago precipitation was far under normal but in this period 5.01 inches of rain have fallen in the Rogue valley. Placer operations had been held up by lack of water but all mountain streams were now running full. Rogue river has risen three feet in the past two days and gives indications of a further rise with warm rains falling in the higher mountains.
