SALEM, Ore., Nov. 22 (AP)— To facilitate the selection of a location for the state tuberculosis hospital to be situated somewhere in Eastern Oregon, approved by the people in the election of Nov. 2, the state board of control is sending a questionnaire to all eligible counties. Any county east of the Cascade mountains is eligible.

Sixteen general points of inquiry are covered in the questionnaire. Weather conditions are considered important. The board wants to know the altitude of each place bidding for the hospital. The annual precipitation of rain and snow, the number of days of sunshine and the amount of fog, the average number of windy days or months in both summer and winter and whether the winds carry dust or snow are other questions asked. Also the temperature of all seasons and the period that is free from frost are asked.

Population Figures.
Another question is the population of the nearest center, its distance from the site offered and further information is asked as to train and stage transportation and condition of roads, whether paved, gravel or dirt.

The direction of slope and the elevation above the main arteries of commerce are deemed important. Detailed information is asked about water supply, source of power and whether it is approved by the state board of health. Source of electric light and supply, distance of the site from the distributing center and a schedule of rates are asked.

Other Questions.
Other questions pertain to sewage disposal and drainage and whether these meet with approval of the state board of health.

What natural advantages such as woods, lakes, streams, parks are available so as to enhance the permanent value of the location. It is one question, further whether there are special advantages that would affect the building and future cost of the institution.

The board wants to know what would be the source of fresh fruits, vegetables, eggs and milk, also the source of the fuel supply and the approximate unit cost.

Whether there is a sufficient acreage, 20 or more acres, available, and whether there would be permanent protection from surrounding development are included in questionnaire. DAIRYMEN MEET; HEAR JAMISON

Commercial Agent of Idaho Favors East Oregon Association

N. C. Jamison, dairy specialist of the Oregon Agricultural college extension service, was the principal speaker at an all-day meeting of the Union dairymen Saturday at the high school building at Union, which was attended by about 30 persons.

Mr. Jamison reviewed the dairy marketing situation in the United States telling of conditions now as compared with a year ago, reporting a slight decrease during that time in the dairy business.

Mr. Goble, who has charge of the truck service for the Cooperative Creamery of Payette, Ida., recommended that the dairymen of Union and Baker counties form an Eastern Oregon dairymen's organization.

A large number of farmers from both counties sell their cream through the cooperative creamery at Payette, and a two-county organization would probably get better results, he said.

Committee Appointed.
A committee, consisting of J. A. Crawford and Frank Hall, of Union, and T. R. Johnson, of Cove, was appointed to meet with representatives from the Baker association to discuss the organization.

H. G. Avery, county agriculturist, was the third speaker. He discussed the importance of better pasture and the use of sweet clover as pasture.

There were several other program numbers also, including music and readings. Mrs. Coleman, of Haines, sang a solo.

The meeting started at 11 o'clock in the morning and continued until about 4 o'clock in the afternoon. The wives of the dairymen served a cafeteria luncheon at noon, with the Payette creamery company furnishing ice cream.

TRIBUNAL RULES ON AUTO SEIZURE

WASHINGTON, Nov. 22 (AP)—Automobiles being purchased on the installment plan, with title remaining in the motor company, were held by the supreme court today to be subject to forfeiture by the government when used in the illegal transportation of intoxicating liquor.

The decision was in a case from Alabama. A somewhat similar proceeding has come up from Washington state.

The Ship Owners association of the Pacific coast and the Pacific S. S. association were declared by the supreme court today to be seemingly violating the anti-trust laws by their plan for the employment of seamen through employment bureaus established by them.

The court did not pass directly on the question of guilt, however, but remanded the case to the district court for trial on its merits.

Disappointed Lover Kills Widow, Famous for Her Many Conquests

SAN FRANCISCO, Nov. 22 (AP)—A story of numerous heart conquests by a young widow who finally was slain by the most persistent of her lovers has been unfolded here with the death of Mrs. Beatty Claire King.

The love adventures were shot to death in a restaurant here Saturday night while the patrons looked on helplessly. Her assailant was George W. Barnett, who deserted a wife and three children in Minneapolis to follow the fascinating widow.

Shoots Himself.
After killing Mrs. King, the object of his insane jealousy, Barnett reversed the pistol and shot himself through the head. At the Central Emergency hospital to which he was removed, physicians said that his wound would be fatal. He clung to life by only a thread today.

Police detectives investigating the case said they learned that Mrs. King had for several years fitted moth-like from one admirer to another, sometimes "playing" several at a time. Even on the night she was killed, the police said, she had planned a meeting with a man with whom her name had been linked recently. Barnett's jealousy of this man is thought to have been the immediate motive of the slaying.

Married Rancher.
The story also showed that Mrs. King had married C. W. Cedarquest, wealthy Santa Cruz, Cal., rancher, after she had induced him to deed certain property to her. Cedarquest, however, obtained an annulment of the marriage when he learned that Barnett was entangled with his wife and that he was in Santa Cruz during their honeymoon. Mrs. King turned back the property he had given her.
