THE SMALL BOY'S OBJECTION TO A DOSE OF CASTOR OIL SHOULD BE RESPECTED

Member Gorgas Memorial Inst. Castor Oil, salts, or cathartics of one kind or another, are generally found in every household. Their use for pains in the stomach or abdomen are often dangerous. They may even be deadly in their effects. They are doubtless responsible for thousands of unnecessary deaths each year in the United States.

Whereas, in many cases of severe crampy pains in the abdomen, castor oil might do no harm, its use is never essential. Cathartics of

all kinds for colic should be prescribed only by the physician, and their administration should be regarded as carefully as that of the most powerful drugs.

Pain in the stomach, with vomiting, may mean an acute appendicitis. Castor oil, or any cathartic, can do nothing but harm in appendicitis. A simple case may thus be made serious, a visit of two weeks in the hospital prolonged to months; complications multiplied; and complete recovery rendered doubtful.

In all probability, the many deaths following operation for appendicitis could be directly traced to the administration of cathartics. All surgeons regard cathartics as positively dangerous in acute appendicitis.

A severe pain in the abdomen may indicate that the individual is suffering from some form of absolute obstruction of the bowel. A single dose of cathartics can do only injury, and never any good. A goodly proportion of all the deaths following operation for intestinal obstruction could be properly attributed to the use of salts or castor oil before operation.

The castor oil bottle in the family medicine chest could with propriety be labeled "Poison" and marked with the skull and crossbones. All cathartics are poisonous when used for stomach ache with vomiting.

Economical Menu For Turkey Day Dinner Planned

THANKSGIVING MENU (ECONOMICAL) (From School of Home Economics - O. A. C.)

Oyster soup, crisp butter wafers, chicken pie country style, mashed sweet potatoes, white turnips cubed in cream, cranberry jelly celery and nut salad, sweet pickles, jelly, individual pumpkin custard puddings with whipped cream, cider, apples, pears, nuts.

Chicken pie country style is prepared as follows: Dress and cut up two fowls. Place in a stew-pan with one onion, cover with boiling water and let simmer until meat is tender. When half cooked, add seasonings. Remove chicken, strain stock, skin off fat, return to stew-pan and let simmer until reduced to four cups. Thicken stock with one-third cup flour, diluted with enough cold water to pour easily.

When boiling point is reached, add three tablespoons butter, gradually. Place small cup in center of baking dish, arrange pieces of chicken around it, and pour over gravy. Cover with baking powder crust one-half inch thick from the center of which a circular piece two inches in diameter has been removed. Roll remaining dough, one-fourth inch thick, in rectangular shape, cut lengthwise in thirds and braid strips. Place around opening in crust and bake in a hot oven. Remove to plate and arrange a paper collar around dish.

Cranberry jelly celery and nut salad is prepared as follows: To four cups of cranberries add two cups sugar and one cup boiling water. Boil 20 minutes and force through strainer. When mixture begins to thicken, fold in one and one-fourth cups chopped celery and one cup chopped nut meats. Turn into molds and chill.
