

Definite Program On Reclamation Will Be Urged

WASHINGTON, Nov. 23 (AP)—The reclamation bureau will ask congress next season to adopt a definite program for completing unfinished reclamation projects before entertaining proposals for new ones.

Elwood Mead, commissioner of reclamation, said Monday that the bureau was seeking legislative endorsement to complete in the shortest time possible all of its outstanding undertakings.

"We should end the injustice of keeping people waiting and hoping," Dr. Mead said. "Costly projects should be pushed to completion so that waiting settlers may have water to cultivate their farms."

It will require all the income of the bureau for the next ten years to complete existing projects.

Berenger Refuses New Appointment

PARIS, Nov. 23 (AP)—Henry Berenger today declined renewal of his appointment as a minister to the U. S. When notified by Foreign Minister Briand that the council of ministers had decided to renew his commission for another six months, M. Berenger immediately submitted a long letter in which he recalled that he went to Washington to negotiate the debt funding settlement and added: "I fulfilled the mission you entrusted to me."

PUMPKIN PIE

Pastry

2 cups flour 4 teaspoons baking powder
1 tablespoon PANCRUST 1 teaspoon salt
1/2 cup milk

Mix and sift flour, salt and baking powder. Cut in PANCRUST with 2 knives, until mealy. Add milk gradually, mixing with a knife to make a soft dough. Toss on to a floured board and roll until thin.

Mix dry ingredients; add cooked pumpkin, melted butter and eggs. Gradually stir in water and milk. Mix thoroughly. Turn into plate lined with pastry, made according to the above recipe. Bake slowly for about thirty minutes.
