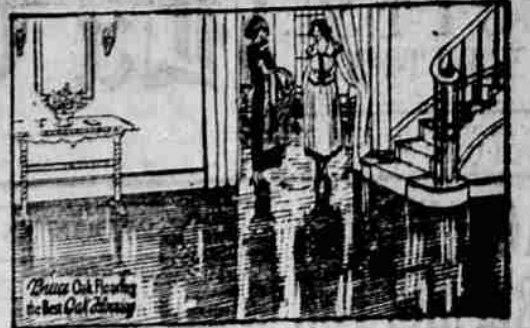

Wildcats Beaten At Enterprise; Cox Out of Tilt

UNION, Ore., Nov. 24 (Special)—The football game between Union and Enterprise at the Enterprise grounds last Saturday resulted in a defeat for the Union boys being unable to score against Enterprise. The game started with Union taking the offensive and during the first quarter the Wildcats outplayed Enterprise, but during the remainder of the game they were on the defensive most of the time. Cox was unable to play the second half and Kuhn went into the line with May retiring to the backfield to replace Cox. Union made more yardage than Enterprise on passes and kicked better than in former games during the season, while Enterprise made most of her yardage by line bucks and end runs. Out of 13 trials for a pass Union completed seven, while Enterprise completed two out of nine trials and intercepted two of Union's passes.

In the last few minutes of the second half Enterprise worked her way across the field by end runs and line bucks for a first touchdown, ending the half with a score of 6-0. In the third quarter the Wallowans made yardage in the same manner and secured their second touchdown and converted. In the first quarter Union was near scoring a time or two but lost the ball when near the goal line and Enterprise, with another apart of line bucks, went over for a third touchdown when the game was just about over, ending the contest with the following score: Enterprise 20; Union 0. Rosenbaum, of La Grande, refereed. Union will end the season with a Thanksgiving game at home, Eight coming here on that date.
