nautics expressed some concern at the heating of the oil, declaring it might indicate that the motor was not receiving sufficient pressure. This, they said, might interrupt the non-stop trial.

The cruiser Cincinnati reported to the navy department that it lost communication with the two planes this morning at 8:45. The Cincinnati, one of the guard ships stationed between the Isle of Pines and Old Providence Island, said that falling to sight the craft, she was starting a search to the north at 11 a. m.

May Establish Record

If the machine reaches Pan America this afternoon it will have established a new record for that type, smashing the mark made by Commander John Rodgers in his

It will have traveled 2,980 miles without a stop as against 1,841 covered by Rodgers and, at the same time will have demonstrated the possibilities of long distance scouting for the fleet.

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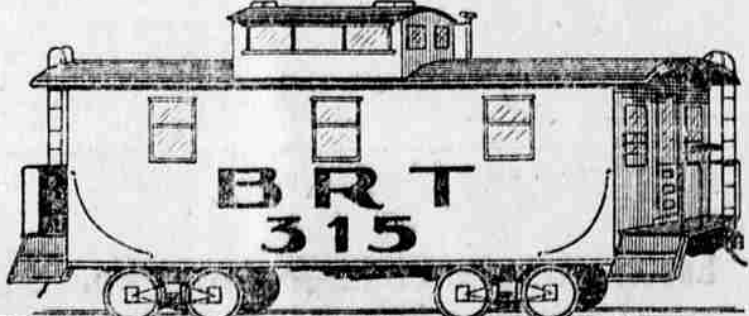
