ROCKNE'S TEAM WELL EQUIPPED

Notre Dame Eleven Has Four Backfields, Each Equal in Strength

SOUTH BEND, Ind., Nov. 24.—(AP)—Knute Rockne's bold plan is never mind—give the readers of what to do in case of an injury to a backfield player on the Notre Dame football team.

Other coaches may grow gray hairs when a star quarter-back or a sensational half-back is knocked out. But in the case of a Notre Dame backfield injury, Rockne can resort to the expedient of calling on the injured man's running mates to carry him off the field and sending into the game in their stead a complete, new set of backs. He can do this up to four times without greatly weakening the team's strength.

Four Sets of Backs The lineup of this season show that Rockne has four sets of backfield players for use against opponents. For the sake of the sport writers who have to stick to the tradition that every football squad must include a first team, a second team and perhaps a third and fourth team, the four Notre Dame backfields are sometimes rated as to comparative strength but as far as Rockne is concerned they are interchangeable and can be used on the occasion demands.

Here's the way the backfield appears: Quarterbacks — Edwards, Parassin, Riley, McNally. Left half-backs — Flanagan, Neime, Roach, Bray. Right half-backs — Heardon, Duhann, Chevigny, Hurley. Fullbacks — Wynne, O'Boyle, Ed Smith, McGrath.

Each backfield is fully equipped with able blockers and forward passers. In the first named combination either Edwards or Flanagan can be depended upon for punting and drop kicking and

three of the combination are able forward passers. They are: Edwards, Flanagan and Heardon. The flying Flanagan, whose snake-like hips slipped from the grasp of several Army tacklers, is of course the outstanding runner of this backfield.

Parassin and Neime are the forward passers of the next combination and Duhann and O'Boyle the blockers. Parassin can hurl a pass with either hand. Injuries received in the Indiana university game kept him out of the army contest but Rockne considers him one of the best forward passers Notre Dame has had in recent years.

Riley and Roach are both the passers and punters of the third mentioned backfield. Smith is a versatile player and can be used in the line in case of necessity.

The burden of both passing and kicking falls largely upon Quarterback McNally in the fourth backfield. He is a basketball star who has been able to put his experience in that sport to good use upon the gridiron.

Rockne has maneuvered his men skilfully throughout the present season and with the single exception of Parassin had his four backfields in shape for every game.

UNIVERSITY OF OREGON, Eugene, Ore., Nov. 25. (Special)—Oregon's 1926 football team has disbanded, and basketball has taken the center of athletic interest.

Oregon will have a better basketball team than last year when they lost the coast championship in a playoff with California according to coaches and sports writers here. Three star letter men, Hoy Oberberg, of Salem; Algot Westergren, of Astoria; and Jerry Gunther, of Portland, are the nucleus for the new team.

Baker Improves 6-Mile Stretch Of Medical Road

BAKER, Ore., Nov. 24.—Crews began work Tuesday on improvement of the six-mile stretch of bad road between Baker and Medical Springs. This became known upon the return of Judge Dodson from a visit of inspection to the road. He immediately ordered emergency work to be done. He was accompanied on his trip by William Dohy, chairman of the state highway commission, and W. H. North, secretary of the chamber of commerce, and State Engineer Bishop.

The road, it was said, will be placed in first class condition for travel so as to serve through the winter and spring. It will afford a good route for the people of Medical Springs, which promises a rapid growth as the result of the location of the new mill of the Grande Ronde Lumber company.

The chamber of commerce has taken active steps to bring this trade to Baker by determining the needs of the community. Judge Dodson found the road in such condition that he ordered crews to begin work.

A second route will be surveyed at an early date, in an effort to choose the most feasible one to serve that district.

It was also announced that the road from the city limits of Baker to the bridge will be improved by grading.

Rolling Log Kills Allen A. McDonald

BAKER, Ore., Nov. 25.—Unable to dodge a log that started rolling on a steep hillside above him, Allen A. McDonald, 52, was killed in the woods of the Oregon Lumber company camp near Bates Tuesday morning.

McDonald was sharpening an axe at the time of the accident and although companions shouted a warning, he evidently could not hear them. The body was brought to Baker Tuesday night. His widow survives.

McDonald started working at Bates the first of November. The family had lived in La Grande and in Klamath Falls.
