SEES CHINA AS FINE APPLE MART

E. E. Benson Urges Creating Demand for Orient for Product

WENATCHEE, Wash., Nov. 25.—This is an opportune time to cultivate the apple market in the Orient, just as America stimulated the wheat market in China in 1925, when domestic markets were glutted, says E. E. Benson, who was state commissioner of agriculture during the world war.

Benson suggests that surplus apples from the Northwest be sent to China by the Northwest Boxed Apple corporation for disposition at reasonable prices. Cultivating a taste for apples, rather than raising profits, should be the motive in sending the apples to the Orient, Mr. Benson said.

F. A. Shell, Cashmere, shipped some Golden Delicious apples in cardboard cartons, crated like eggs, to an eastern firm as an experiment. He shipped one carload last week and expects to ship another this week-end. The cartons used are 20x12x12 inches and 23x12x15. Each size container has 75 compartments, into which the apples are placed after being double wrapped. After a tier has been packed a cardboard is placed on top and another tier added.

DIPHTHERIA ON DECREASE; FIGHT SCARLET FEVER

tion of susceptibility to scarlet fever is carried out by injecting into the skin a very minute amount of the diluted scarlet fever toxin. If the person is susceptible there will appear, at the site of the injection, a zone of redness of about the size of a penny. This redness is most marked at the end of 24 hours, at which time the test should be read, and rapidly fades thereafter. Persons immune to scarlet fever have no reactions whatever.

To immune susceptible persons a very minute amount of the scarlet fever toxin is injected hypodermically, and then at intervals of five to seven days slightly increasing doses are injected, until all five doses have been given. There is no discomfort or pain; even local reactions being rare. At least a month after the final injection the Dick test should be made to determine if the person has been completely immunized.

Urges Prompt Action

Now is the time to get protection. Consult your physician or your health officer. Oregon had 1408 cases and 18 deaths from scarlet fever in 1925. These figures should and will be materially reduced by the end of next year if health officials, physicians, and the public wage as active a campaign against scarlet fever as they did against diphtheria.

Wallace Is Facing Shortage of Homes

WALLACE, Idaho, Nov. 25.—According to plans worked out at the weekly meeting of the board of trade, shortage of homes will be given immediate attention. Wallace has been growing rapidly the last year, which has caused a crowded condition.

After a thorough discussion of this problem, in which estimated costs of buildings were considered, the matter was referred to a special committee, composed of members representing mining companies, merchants, contractors and financing companies, and a public utility committee. It is planned to construct several apartment houses, which will house 10 or more families each. It is the opinion of many real estate dealers that there is need of 50 apartments to meet the demand for homes.

local creamery, said that about 28 or more dairies were operating in La Grande at present and that many of these were not reached by state inspection.

All taking part in the discussion were unanimous in the opinion that the proposed inspection would be worthless unless it covered every phase of the producing and handling, including the condition of the workmen. Landis pointed out that it is often the workman who is apt to contaminate the milk because of his being susceptible to some disease, thus necessitating a strict inspection of all who handle the milk before it reaches the consumer.

The cost of inspection, provided the city pays for this work, is more or less hazy, so the matter was attended to by referring this to the city manager and ordering the ordinance laid over until next Wednesday night without a first reading.

Traffic Law Amended.

An amendment to the traffic ordinance, passed a week ago, preventing freights from using Adams avenue, was revoked and the ordinance readopted.
