## COOKING HINTS

For flaky hot breads there is no better shortening than PANCRUST. Try this recipe:

Beaten Biscuit  
8 cups flour 1 cup cold water  
9 level tablespoons 1 cup cold milk  
PANCRUST 1 1/2 teaspoons salt  
Pinch of soda

Sift dry ingredients. Rub PANCRUST in well with hands. Add cold milk and water gradually to make very stiff dough. Beat well for 1/2 hour. Roll out into little biscuits, and prick top several times with fork. Bake in moderate oven about thirty minutes.

Following is a part of an interview recently given by Mrs. H. McKinstry Sherman, president of the General Federation of Women's clubs, on the subject "Will Club Women Abandon Culture," and printed in the November issue of the Oregon Federation News.

"Women may be sleeping, they may be a little slow about asserting themselves in like manner as their beloved male companions, but it becomes increasingly dangerous to trifle with them on points that concern the honor of a nation or the protection and conservation of our resources, both human and otherwise."

"Grant that women's clubs were first prompted by a wish to catch up and preserve every passing chance at self-improvement, it was neither a pose nor a selfish gesture toward high-brow isolation. Viewed through strong historical lenses and weighed upon today's discriminating scales, we are forced to the conclusion that the whole movement grew out of woman's primal and governing instinct to serve. It will always be her motive."

GALL STONES AND "QUACK" CURES!

To the well informed, it may sound unbelievable that, in this enlightened age, there are people who fall an easy prey to the patient medicine vendor of gall stone cures.

Infections of the gall are very common and require expert treatment at the hands of the physician. It must be remembered that a large proportion of these patients suffer from the formation of gall stones. Gall stones are concretions of bile, and are composed chiefly of carbon, hydrogen and oxygen, bile pigment, some organic matter and inorganic salts.

Gall stones do not always cause the typical gall stone colic, quite frequently only disturbance in a chronic dyspepsia, associated with stomach distention, belching of gas, etc. A large number of people, who have been afflicted for years with chronic gastritis are suffering from gall stones.

The stones usually occupy the gall bladder, occasionally also the gall tract. In some cases the stone is large enough to completely prevent the passage of bile. Then the patient develops obstructive jaundice, a condition which, unless relieved by operation, always ends in death.

Associated with gall stone disease, chronic infection of the gall bladder and biliary tract frequently occurs. Ever since men learned to

diagnose gall stone disease unceasing efforts have been made to find some remedy that would dissolve the stones. Anything and everything that would increase the flow of bile has been used for this purpose give abundant passage to apparently hard concretions, greenish brown in appearance and looking very much like gall stones.

The truth, however, is that the concretions are not gall stones at all, and upon examination are found to be nothing more than soap lumps.

There is the trick of gall stone cures. The magic remedy consists of well flavored oil which is taken and followed by a large dose of alkaline cathartic. The alkali and the oil mixing in the bowel form soapy concretions of various size, which the victim is expected to believe represents gall stones.

No medicine can cure gall stones. Timely operation will give the best result by preventing liver impairment and years of invalidism to the patient.

Construction work of the Grande Ronde Lumber company is being rushed as fast as possible, rain and bad roads being somewhat of a handicap.

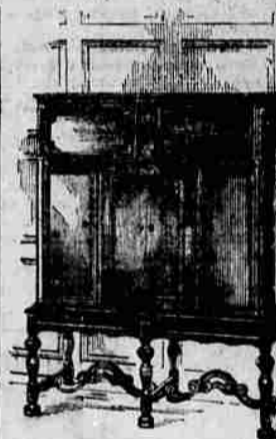
