"Black Pirate" Stirs Crowds At Arcade

The main reason for the tremendous pleasure which Douglas Fairbanks' pictures have given in the past is that Doug appeals strongly to that part of a man's mind that never grows up. In each of his stories he has been just what every small boy dreams of being, and these dreams never quite fade away as the small boys reach manhood.

His latest picture, "The Black Pirate" which opened at the Arcade theater last night, catches this spirit to a degree never reached by him before. Pirate—here's a word that takes you back to your boyhood days. Buried treasure! Who wouldn't like to chuck all the petty things of life's daily grind to go in search of it? Small wonder, then, that Doug's new picture will act as a magnet for all the small boys from 7 to 70, that it will thrill them and send them away with a feeling that for two hours they have been living the kind of life they've always wanted to live.

There is much that is beautiful, much that is brave and thrilling and spectacular in "The Black Pirate." The picture is entirely in natural colors (incidentally, it is the best color job, from a mechanical standpoint that we have ever seen) and you can easily imagine how lovely are the scenes showing the moon rippling over the water, the pirates thronging the decks and clambering up the rigging and burying their treasure in the golden sands of the tropical island. That night, Grace, eavesdropping on Compton at his ranch house, is caught and imprisoned by the rancher, and the spurs she had borrowed from Jack are taken from her.

Next morning, Jack is arrested by the sheriff, who tells him the bank has been robbed, and his spurs have been found near the vault. He escapes, however, and rides to Compton's to find Grace a prisoner. He releases her, and puts her on guard over Compton's herdsman, who had been the lone sentinel, then, an information given him by Grace, rides furiously to prevent Compton and his men from letting the wild horses out of the valley.
