BUTTER VALUES STILL CLIMBING

All Grades Up Today in Portland—Storage Holdings Shrink

PORTLAND, Ore., Nov. 29 (AP)—Butter values are sharply higher in the local market, following the advance in prices and butterfat bids. On the dairy exchange, all grades are up today, with extra 1½ cents higher at 42½¢ and standards 2 cents higher at 42½¢. Lower grades advanced a cent at 41¢ for prime firsts and 38½¢ for firsts.

Receipts of country cubes have not responded to recent advances and local operators are eager to get the cube market more in line with print prices. Monday's receipts from the country amounted to 9,117 pounds, while the mail of local creameries was reported at 14,450 pounds.

Storage holdings are now down to 176,214 pounds, showing a decrease of 2,643 pounds for the day.

Current receipt eggs are 2 cents higher in the local market at 42¢ while other grades were unchanged. Receipts Monday totaled 413 cases and 747 cases were pulled out of storage. Eastern markets are easier.

Country dressed meats and poultry remain generally steady and unchanged. Commission firms are inclined to hold on to hog since prices at the yards advanced, but the retail butchers are not eager to follow that lead. Good hogs worth 16½¢ with top calves around 16¢. Poultry market stagnant since holiday.

Stock Prices on Upward Movement

NEW YORK, Nov. 30 (AP)—Stock prices started upward again this afternoon after an early period of heaviness.

Rail shares were slightly firmer on the publication of additional October earnings data from a 15 Chesapeake and Ohio, which has been under pressure for several days, received better support, Baldwin led the early afternoon advance, rallying from a low of 153½ to 156½.

General Motors, General Asphalt and several of the tobacco and sugar shares also registered substantial gains. Establishment of new peak prices by American Can preferred, American Home Products and Rock Island, 7 per cent preferred was offset by new low prices in Advance-Rumley, Royal Silk, Hosiery, Savage Arms and American Snuff preferred.

The closing was steady. Baking, sugar and tobacco shares led the upward movement in the final hour when several minor stocks touched new top prices. South Porto Rico soared 5 points to a new 1926 peak. Ward Bakings and Christie Brown were among the stocks to advance 2 points or more. Total sales approximated 1,250,000 shares.

Weakness Noted In Wheat Market

CHICAGO, Nov. 30 (By the Associated Press)—Opening ½¢ off to ½¢ up, wheat studied at about yesterday's closing figures. Corn, oats and provisions developed firmness, also corn, starting at 5¢ lower to an equal advance, and later showing slight gains all around.

Wheat closed weak, ½ to 1½¢ net lower; corn unchanged to ½¢ up; oats unchanged to ½¢ off, and provisions unchanged to 37¢ higher.

Willamette River Reaches High Mark

PORTLAND, Ore., Nov. 30 (AP)—With cessation of heavy rain-fall, menace of a flood in the Willamette river was passing today, said Observer E. L. Wells. The crest was expected to be about 14 feet here tomorrow or Thursday.

EUGENE, Ore., Nov. 30 (AP)—The Willamette river was at stage of 32 feet this morning, the highest mark of the fall season. It is not an unusual sight for this time of year, but considering the fact that a few weeks ago it stood at the zero level, it is indicative of sufficiency of moisture. The Stux-law river is reported to be rising, and streams in all parts of the country are filled. Roads in some directions are flooded, and some roads have been closed because of the weakened condition of bridges.

KLAMATH FALLS, Ore., Nov. 30 (AP)—Today saw no let up to the continued precipitation which has resulted in clogged storm sewers and flooded basements within the city, flooded roads in the country districts and deposited from 12 inches to four feet of snow in nearby wooded country. Precipitation to date is a fraction less than seven inches since beginning of the storm. There has been no damage of any consequence. Stockmen in the Lakeview district, 100 miles east of here, estimate value of the downpour at hundreds of thousands of dollars.

RATE APPLICATION—SALEM, Ore., Nov. 29 (AP)—An application for authority to increase the service rates was filed with the public service commission today by the Coos and Curry telephone company. If the increase is granted the company promises to extend and improve its toll lines and give a 24 hour service at Powers.
