**Vale High Has 32 Outside Students**

VALE, Ore.—Of 96 students enrolled in the Vale high school, 32 are young people whose homes are outside of school district No. 15. They are called nonresidents or tuition students. Based on the tuition allowed by the school district treasury a total of \$4,908.00. For the reason that a larger number of students from outside are attending the Vale school this year than in 1925, the district will benefit by nearly a \$200 increase.

The percentage of outside tuition students attending the Vale high school is better than 25 per cent while 32 per cent of the students in the Ontario high school are tuition students.
