## BUTTER ADVANCE GIVES TO SLUMP

### Brisk Upward Movement Checked; Prices Drop to Saturday Level

PORTLAND, Ore., Dec. 1 (AP).—The brisk advance started in cube butter prices at the opening of the week met with a sudden jolt and today top grades are back down again to practically last Saturday's close.

On the dairy exchange both extras and standards were posted a cent lower at 42½ and 41½ respectively. No change was made in the lower grades of cubes. Receipts of surplus cubes from country creameries were unusually heavy during the past 24 hours with a total of 12,562 pounds reported in. At the same time the make of the local creameries amounted to 15,193 pounds and storage withdrawals were liberal at 12,694 pounds.

## WHEAT GAINS AFTER EARLY SLUMP TODAY

CHICAGO, Dec. 1 (AP).—Opening at 1½ decline to 1½ advance, wheat sagged all around and then rose to above yesterday's finish. Corn, oats and provisions were firmer, corn starting ½ to ½ higher and subsequently showing decided gains.

Wheat closed strong, 1½ to 2½ net higher; corn, 2½ to 3½ net up; oats showing to ½ advance and provisions unchanged to a rise of 2½.

## Home Pointers

(From School of Home Economics—O. A. C.)  
In roasting a turkey or fowl of any kind, dryness is prevented by roasting the breast down instead of up.

Raw cranberry relish is delicious and easy to make. The cranberries are put through a grinder and equal amounts of sugar added. The mixture is then placed in a covered jar and allowed to stand for two weeks when it is ready to serve. It will keep indefinitely.

A delicious ten-minute dessert is made with one cup of thick cream whipped, white of one egg beaten until stiff, and 19 cents worth of peanut brittle rolled on the board with a rolling pin; combined by carefully cutting and folding together it is served cold in sherbet glasses.

Stale bread is freshened by wrapping the loaf in a dampened cloth and setting it in a warm oven until the loaf becomes soft and is again like fresh warm bread.

This meal is lacking in iron which is necessary for rich, red blood and good health. Hashed brown potatoes, scalloped corn, bread and butter, jelly, applesauce, and sugar cookies. Foods rich in iron are liver, lean meat, fish, eggs, spinach, carrots, whole-grain bread and cereals, and beans.

Bloodspots are removed by moistening a small piece of cotton cloth with salvia and placing it on the spot. Left a few moments the spot will disappear.

## Demand for Oil Shares Brisk in Street Trading

NEW YORK, Dec. 1 (AP).—A sudden demand for the oil shares featured the resumption of the upward movement in today's stock market.

The advance was led by Atlantic Refining which was quickly bid up 4 points and tended to confirm widespread rumors of a "December oil market."

Phillips petroleum and Mid-Continent Oil preferred were bid up to new 1925 peak prices. Prices preferred touched a new top price and Jersey Central was bid up 3 points.

Nearly a score other issues had established new peak prices before the end of the third hour, including several tobaccos and publications. Reynolds Tobacco "B" was an outstanding weak spot, yielding over 3 points.

The closing was strong. Early bidding for the oil shares galvanized the motor stocks and other industrials into increased activity in the final hour. Atlantic Refining rallied nearly 6 points and Huntington Typewriter 5. Total sales approximated 1,400,000 shares.
