Sister Mary Says:

BREAKFAST—Stewed prunes, cereal, thin-cream, creamed oranges on toast, granola pop-overs, milk, coffee.

LUNCHEON—Boston baked beans, steamed brown bread, spinach salad, potato caramel cake, canned cherries, milk, tea.

DINNER—Casserole of rabbit, mashed potatoes, ten minute cabbage, grapefruit salad, ginger bread with whipped cream, rye bread, milk, coffee.

Potato Caramel Cake—Four eggs, 2 cups light brown sugar, 2-3 cup butter, 2 cups flour, 1/2 cup sweet milk, 1 cup hot mashed potato, 1 cup grated chocolate, 1 cup nut meats, 2 teaspoons baking powder, 2 teaspoons cinnamon, 1 teaspoon cloves, 1/2 teaspoon nutmeg, 1/2 teaspoon salt.

CREAM BUTTER AND SLOWLY add sugar, beating hard. Add yolks of eggs, beating until mixture is very light and creamy. Melt chocolate and add to hot mashed potato, beating in milk, mix and sift flour, salt, baking powder and spices. Put mixtures together, beating well. Stir in dry ingredients and nuts. Fold in whites of eggs beaten until stiff and dry. Turn into a large cake pan with a chimney and bake one hour in a moderate oven. Cover with a boiled frosting or not as preferred.

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Oregon Guard Is Praised by Major General

WASHINGTON, Dec. 3.—Major General Creed C. Hammond, who came to be chief of the militia bureau from the Oregon National Guard, declares in his annual report that the guard has steadily improved in efficiency and has reached a point where it can be considered as an active component of the national defense to function at any time it might be called upon for active field service.

In proof of the results accomplished, General Hammond summarizes comment made by the corps area commanders, in which both weak and strong points are listed, but in which the active generals of the army warmly complimented the effort and achievements of the national guard.

The report for the ninth corps area, which includes the Pacific coast states, declares the guard in very satisfactory condition, with increased attendance at armory drills, greater interest in officers' schools and improvement in training programs and schedules.

Weak points listed are failure to protect men by inoculation and vaccination, failure to use target practice facilities, lack of riding halls for mounted units and large turnover of personnel. Seriousness of purpose and excellent standards are named as the strong points of the organization.

General Hammond says he is in hearty sympathy with the financial program of the president and the budget, which limits and substantially forbids the organization of new units of the guard, but says he is convinced the budget requirements should be modified to permit the organization of the limited number of units required to complete existing organizations of first priority as set forth in the project for development of the national guard.

Farmer Kills Bear With Brush Hook

REEDSFORT, Dec. 3.—To kill a bear with a brush hook and to serve the meat on Thanksgiving day is the story brought to Reedspport by Frank Leach, 59, farmer residing on the Umpqua river, near Scottsburg, one of the oldest settlements in Oregon. The animal weighed about 150 pounds and had been caught in a trap. After a hard struggle the bear was clubbed and snatched to death by the farmer with his brush hook.

Bear are more plentiful this season than formerly, according to reports. At the same ranch, during the week, three bears invaded the orchard. One was killed by sons of Leach.
