

7 New Names to Be Called When Congress Convenes Next Monday

WASHINGTON, Dec. 3 (AP)—Seven new names not heretofore on the roll of the sixty-ninth congress will appear when it convenes next Monday, while an eighth, that of Harry R. Hawes of Missouri, will be called in the senate instead of the house.

Of new comers, five take up their duties on Capitol Hill for the first time and two return after an absence of one session.

The five strangers are: David W. Stewart, elected to the senate for three months to fill the seat from Iowa left vacant through the death of Albert R. Chambers; Arthur L. Gould, elected from Maine to fill the senate post of the late senator Robert M. Ferris; Harry L. Engelbright and Richard J. Welch, who fill vacancies caused by death in the California house delegation.

John J. Cochran, who takes the place of Hawes in the Missouri house delegation.

The other two names are familiar in Capitol Hill. David I. Walsh returns to fill the seat of Senator William M. Butler, while former Representative Frederick W. Dallinger takes the place of the late Representative Harry I. Thayer of Massachusetts. By changing from the house to the senate, Hawes replaces George H. Williams as the junior senator from Missouri.

In the filling of these vacancies the democrats gain two votes in the senate through the administration of Walsh and Hawes who won in the last election the seats Butler and Williams were holding by virtue of appointments. The republicans, however, gain a vote in the house.

LISTEN TO RADIO

WASHINGTON, Dec. 3 (AP)—Congress expects to listen in on the radio this winter to programs coming in not only on the receiving set at home, but also to the broadcasting of a number of its members from the floors of the house and senate.

In other words, radio legislation, which not infrequently in the closing days of the last session, is slated for another turn on the main track of the legislative program.

Two radio bills, one the White bill coming from the house and the other the Hill bill from the senate, were so unlike each other that both houses appointed a group of members to confer on the matter and attempt to adjust differences. This group of conferees met and state immediately issued forth. When congress adjourned July 3, the two bills still were drawn out in the conferees.

Both the White and Hill bills are designed to give the federal government broader control of radio activities, but proposed different methods of going about it. Representative White, republican, Maine, feels that his plan is best, while Senator Hill, Democrat, Washington, is convinced what he suggests would be better. Whether radio legislation is enacted at the forthcoming session probably will depend largely upon the attitude of the authors of the two measures.

The White bill proposes that the federal government exercise control over the ether through a bureau in the commerce department and also a radio commission to be created by congress. The Hill measure would place sole power to regulate the ether in the hands of a commission. This latter measure also proposed by a declaration, as follows:

"That it is hereby declared and

reaffirmed that the limits of the United States, its territories and possessions, either within the inalienable possession of the people thereof, and that the authority to regulate its use interest and foreign commerce is conferred upon the congress of the United States by the federal constitution."

MAGNET TO PICK METAL ON ROADS

To help eliminate causes of tire punctures a huge electric magnet is being placed in service on the state highways of South Dakota. It is the work brought here by travelers from the middle west.

Constructed by the South Dakota state college engineering department, it will pick up nails, screws, bolts and iron particles from the road. It is mounted on a truck and a generator can by a gasoline engine will supply the electricity.

PARKING WAR IS WAGED IN DETROIT

A miniature parking war is being fought in Detroit. Motorists are refusing to obey the parking restrictions and Traffic Inspector Schink is looking for six more tow cars so he may bring at least 350 cars a day to the pound.

PLANE PASSENGER SERVICE STARTED

An airplane passenger service has been established between Detroit and Grand Rapids, Mich. The service operates every day except Saturday and Sunday and covers the distance in an hour and 45 minutes.

"I've seen Clara," the tobacco planter had declared long before the body of the 22-year-old girl was found in a shallow grave on Battle Ridge near Ridgeway, a quarter of a mile from the home of Redman Olson, who has been charged with the slaying.
