Arrested Sunday—The man was taken Sunday afternoon by Chief Juddkins had satisfied himself that the suspect answered the description of the stranger wanted in Seattle, Portland and San Francisco.

He inquired for a room, and in looking over the house was given an opportunity of seeing the man. He returned later with Sergeant Strait and asked Yoffe to accompany him to police headquarters.

Following is the conversation that is said to have taken place:
"What charge am I being arrested for?"
"No charge," replied the chief. "we are just going to hold you for investigation."
"It isn't for that. Strangle affair is it?" the man is alleged to have asked.
The chief advised him that the authorities would talk to him at headquarters.

Descriptions Tally—Yoffe had picked up his suitcase and dropped it to the floor when he began to talk. Sergeant Strait examined it and found that it corresponded in appearance exactly to the one said to have been

in the possession of the stranger.

Yoffe is dressed in a dark blue suit of heavy material, also talking with the broadest description. He is medium height with powerful upper arms and broad shoulders. He wears horn-rimmed eyeglasses and is dark complexioned with the characteristics of an Italian or a Hebrew.

When he registered with Mrs. Menke at the time he engaged a room, he paid in cash and gave the name of Harris. When arrested he stated his name was John Harris. The name sent out in police bulletins gave the name Adrian Harris as one used by the stranger.

When asked today by Van Sverre where he wanted to go, Seattle or Portland the suspect answered:
"Any place suits me."

BELOW ZERO WEATHER IN EAST STATES
(Continued from Page One.)
Eastern states from Maine to West Virginia were digging out today from one of the heaviest early season snowfalls on record which caused a half a dozen deaths and seriously impeded traffic.

The snow was 7 to 15 inches deep in the more northerly portions of the blanketed area, although much lighter in West Virginia, Washington and Delaware. It was the heaviest for the season in 46 years here.

Northern New York suffered most severely. There was three deaths in Buffalo. Though there was no high wind in that part of the state and little drifting of the snow, and roads and railroads were kept open. The temperature fell to three degrees at Rochester and the automobile club of that city received many calls for assistance from motorists with frozen radiators and cars stuck in snow banks. More than 100 boats were caught in the ice on the Erie and Champlain divisions.

A thousand men were employed

in 12 hour shifts in the street cleaning department of New York City today to prevent a general tie-up in traffic. Six hundred and seventy plows and tractors were in operation, concentrating on the approaches bridges and ferries over which the city's daily food supply must come. The chief traffic delay occurred on the cross town trolley lines the main thoroughfare having been opened today.

Most of the railroads suffered delays, some trains coming in more than three hours late.

Nearly 400 persons were given lodging at the municipal lodging house last night. The Salvation Army took care of 600 men, with about 1000 more crowded into the lobby of its Hovey hotel, and gave shelter to 200 women.

The coldest weather was at Northfield, where 19 degrees below zero was reported.

In New Jersey most of the railroad trains were on four or more behind schedule. There was one death in the state. The icy and serious jammed trolley cars in Long Branch, N. J., and Bristol, Pa.

ICE BOY ND IN ST. LAWRENCE "QUEER" Dec. 5 (AP)—Fourteen steamers most of them outwound bound, were ice bound in the St. Lawrence today. Several of the ships were carried back and forth by the ice for hours at a stretch, unable to pull into the harbor or remain stationary on account of dragging anchors.
