Film Comedian Plans Attempt To Settle Row

LOS ANGELES, Dec. 6. (AP)—Further attempts to effect a settlement of the marital difficulties of Charles Chaplin, film comedian and his estranged wife, the former Lita Grey, will be taken this week by attorneys for the pair.

Preliminary conferences were held last week by George Beesh, attorney for Mrs. Chaplin, and Lloyd Wright, representing the actor, which resulted in the way being paved for further negotiations. Although no date has been set for the next parley, it was indicated that the attorneys would again confer during the early part of this week.

Whether the Chaplin domestic battle will be carried to the courts depends, it is said, upon the ability of the opposing counsel to agree on terms of a compromise.

The stumbling block in the way of an amicable settlement, it was admitted on both sides, is the question of who is to have custody of the two Chaplin children, Charles Spencer Jr. and Sydney Earle, two and one years old, respectively.

Mrs. Chaplin, who now has the two boys with her at the home of her grandparents, is determined to keep them. The comedian has announced he would go to court if necessary to obtain their custody.

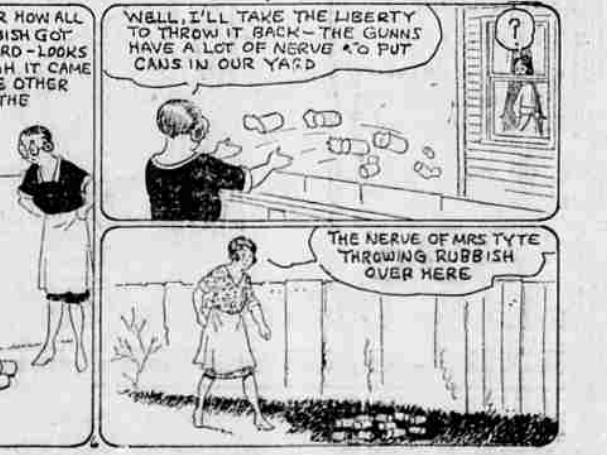
