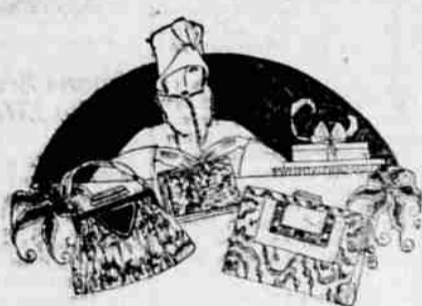

### DEMPSEY PLANS RING COMEBACK

Former King of Heavyweights Starts Training for Tunney Fight

LOS ANGELES, Dec. 7 (AP)—Jack Dempsey, former heavy-weight champion, waiving the formality of a few warm-up fights, will start training next week for a return bout with Gene Tunney, to whom he lost the world's title last September at Philadelphia. This he announced today, saying: "If I can come back, I can whip Tunney, and if I can't come back, I'm through with the fight game. I don't want any set ups." Reporting to reports that he had been poisoned before the fight with Tunney, the former champion declared: "All this stuff about throwing fights, being poisoned or worried to death is a lot of hokum. Tunney can whip any man in the ring to-day. He is a stiff couple puncher and, who! I think he could have whipped Hippo—and probably had Carpenter even—Jesse Willard and Bill Brennan would have slaughtered him." "I was worried in Philadelphia the day of the fight. I had enough to worry me with a lot of hokum being hanging over me—and don't think I didn't know the trouble. Tunney was having staging the fight—but it didn't bother my fighting ability in any way, shape or form. Naturally, it does not help you to have a lot of squabbling around you, but I lost to Tunney because I was overtrained—down too fine."

### Football Board Will Not Permit Mac-Hi to Play

MEDFORD, Ore., Dec. 7 (AP)—The state board of high school athletics this morning refused to grant permission for a football game in this city next Saturday between the McLoughlin high school of Milton-Freewater and the Medford high school squads on the grounds that McLoughlin had incurred the challenge of the West-Idaho team for a game last Saturday, and that McLoughlin's claim to the Eastern Oregon title therefore is not clear. The Medford team has disbanded and no further challenges will be considered. Medford citizens guaranteed McLoughlin \$1,000 expenses for the game. The Medford school, at the schedule meeting in January of the southern Oregon conference will invite Great high of Portland to play a football game in this city next fall. Medford going to Grant the following year.

GUILDFORD, England, Dec. 7 (AP)—While search for the missing American novelist, Katha Clark, continues throughout England and even on the continent, the local police are entering upon "silent pool" which legend says is bottomless. The pool is not far from the spot where Mrs. Christie's car was found Sunday in a hedge. She left her home in Sunningdale alone in the car late Friday night. Gridlocks on long rapids are being dragged through the murky waters of the pool, the operations continuing day and night. "Silent pool" is the center of numerous legends, one to the effect that King John so frightened a woodcutter's daughter that the girl threw herself in the pond and was drowned, her body never being recovered. The king stuck a feather in the back before passing on his way, the tale continues and this in time grew into a great bogging willow which borders the pool. Mrs. Christie used this region as the locale of several stories, one in particular featuring "silent pool" as a body of water of fascinating mystery.

## Vitamin B Test Is Conducted by Penn State Man

STATE COLLEGE, Pa., Dec. 7 (AP)—Scientists at the Pennsylvania State college agricultural experiment station have had a small doorway placed in the first and largest stomach of a Penn State homestead pig, Jessie, a two-year-old purchased Holstein heifer, for the purpose of analyzing food absorbed.

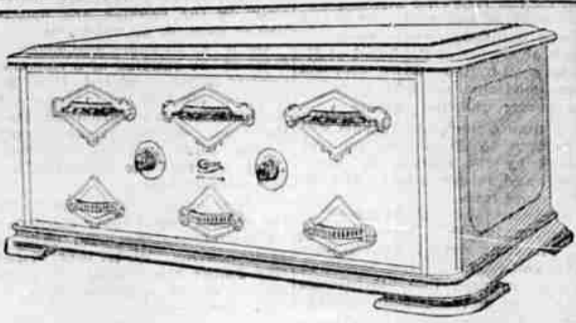
Dr. J. J. Reichel has proven that a more milk will contain vitamin even when that necessary dietary substance is left out of all food consumed. It is believed that the cow has the power of using the bacteria in her rumen to manufacture vitamin B. Samples of rumen contents will be taken through the little doorway, and vitamin B dissolved in alcohol and extracted if present. The residue will be fed to rats. If the rats thrive like others that receive a vitamin B ration, Dr. Reichel will be on the road to a solution of the problem. The operation was simple and harmless and Jessie is still active.
