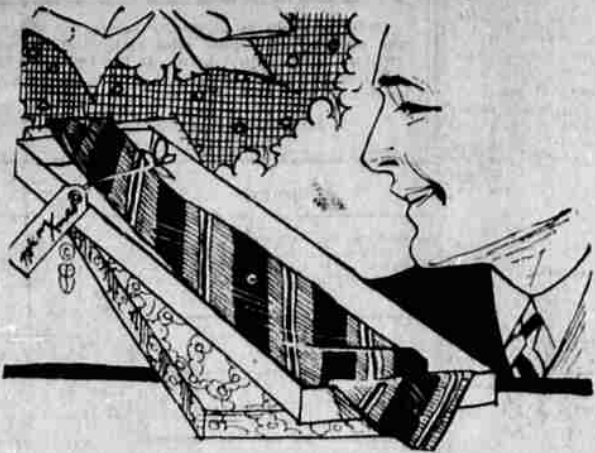

## IDAHO WOOL ON PORTLAND MART

Approximately 1,500,000 Pounds Offered for Sale Today

PORTLAND, Ore., Dec. 7 (AP).—Approximately 1,500,000 pounds of Idaho wool, stored here was offered for sale this afternoon under sealed bids. It was the annual pool offered by the First National bank of Boise, which represented the growers.

Considerable interest was shown in the sale this year with several out-of-town buyers on hand. They clips have been open to inspection during the past week. Numerous local buyers were on hand with orders from eastern manufacturers.

Several Idaho growers, members of the pool, also were on hand to witness the sale.

Some of the outstanding clips offered were those of the Idaho Livestock company, the graded lot of Andy Little, the Big Springs lot and the assorted lot of the Red Island Sheep company.

Should prices prove unsatisfactory the offerings may be withdrawn and held until a later date.

## PRICE OF SUGAR MOUNTS STEADILY

### Cane Marked Up to \$6.86 and Beet to \$6.75 a Sack in Portland

PORTLAND, Ore., Dec. 7 (AP).—Butter and egg prices are steady in the local market with no change made on the dairy exchange for the day. Top cubes are still quoted at the 42 1/2 level with extra eggs at 42c. Receipts of both commodities continue liberal with a slower movement. Butter receipts yesterday amounted to 11,597 pounds from the country with the local make reported at 16,749 pounds. A total of 11,304 pounds came out of storage. Egg receipts yesterday amounted to 293 cases and only 19 cases were reported withdrawn from the coolers.

Sugar markets throughout the country are on the upward swing with values increasing almost daily. Local jobbers have announced a 15c advance in this territory, to become effective at the opening of trade tomorrow. The advance follows a similar boost in the refinery list. New prices on cane will be \$6.85, with beet at \$6.75 a sack. The market is very firm with New York raws advancing sharply again today. Local sugar authorities look for still another advance in coast prices before the end of the week.

## Wheat Slump on Heels of Gain

CHICAGO, Dec. 7 (AP).—Starting at 1/2 to 3/4 higher, wheat values now showed further gain. Corn, oats and provisions also were firmer, with corn opening unchanged to 1/4 up and subsequently establishing a moderate general advance. Wheat closed irregular, 1/2c net lower to 3/4c advance; corn 1/2 to 3/4 up; oats, 1/4 to 3/4 up and provisions unchanged to 1/2c down.

## Six Injured, None Serious, in Fire

SAN FRANCISCO, Dec. 7 (AP).—Six occupants of the Casa Marie apartments in Couch street, a policeman and a taxicab driver were injured, none serious, in a fire which swept through the apartment building today. The fire cut off the main exit and the hundred dwellers were forced to flee or were carried down a narrow rear exit. A number of thrilling rescues were recorded, eight babies and as many women and children being carried to safety by firemen and policemen. The damage was estimated at \$16,000.

## Street Favors Message Given By President

NEW YORK, Dec. 7 (AP).—Stock prices displayed a strong undertone today, but chief speculative activity was again centered in a few high priced industrial issues. Trading continued to be largely professional, although a growing public interest was reported in issues which hold promise of special dividend developments before the end of the year.

President Coolidge's message to congress was favorably received by the financial district, the highest prices of the day being recorded after its recommendations became known. Wall street was particularly interested in the tax relate and railroad consolidation features.

Some of the oils began to show signs of activity and strength, while the markets presented several strong spots.

International Harvester was bid up over 4 points to a new record high of 154 1/2. U. S. Cast Iron Pipe jumped over 5 points and General Motors, American Zinc preferred and Gotham Silk Hosiery sold 3 to 4 points higher. Loose Wilco common and second preferred, which recorded sensational advances yesterday, broke 7 and 6 points, respectively.

Bulls held fairly steady. The closing was firm. Profit-taking was evident in the final hour, notably in several of the oils and in Famous Players and Philip Morris. Buying continued, however, in many other shares.

Great Northern preferred touching Missouri, Kansas and Texas preferred touching a record high above 36 and Chicago and Alton preferred, usually a dormant stock, moving up 2 points. Approximate sales were 1,500,000 shares.
