685,000 POUNDS WOOL PURCHASED

Half of Big Idaho Pool Offered in Portland Finds Buyers

PORTLAND, Ore., Dec. 8 (AP).—Approximately 685,000 pounds or close to half of the big Idaho wool pool, put up for sale here yesterday afternoon, was sold. The other half of the 1,500,000 pound pool will be offered for sale probably right after the first of the year. Some lots may be sold privately.

The sale was well attended with buyers bidding actively although offers generally were low. Prices ranged from 31 to 36¢ a pound on the lots sold. While many of the best clips were disposed of, there were several well known lots of fine wool on which offers were rejected.

Buyers representing eastern concerns made the highest offers, outbidding most of the local wool men.

The Lafayette Woolen Mills of Rhode Island, and Haines, Brownfield and Kincaid of Boston were the two largest buyers. Purchases made by them will be shipped east immediately. Price Movement in Street Irregular

NEW YORK, Dec. 8 (AP).—An opening period of strength, a sharp reaction around midday and then an irregular recovery characterized the price movement in today's stock market.
United States Steel common sold off 2 points from its morning high, and Woolworth reacted several points. On the other hand, Laclede Gas soared nearly 17 points to a new record high of 196 1/2 and South Porto Rican Sugar jumped nearly 5 points to a new peak at 157.

Real Hope Held For Less Labor Controversies

WASHINGTON, Dec. 8 (AP).—There is real hope for a reduction in the number of labor controversies in American industry because the habit of conciliating and mediating disputes is growing stronger, Secretary Davis of the labor department, said yesterday in his annual report.

So long as enterprising men and women engaged in industry bend their energies toward advancement there will be differences of opinion, he said, but with the principles of conciliation being more generally accepted year by year the nation is bound to see a great reduction in the number of disputes reaching a stage where a stoppage of production occurs.
Administration of the immigration laws, vested in the labor department during the past year was "the most satisfactory since the adoption by congress in 1921 of a limitation policy," Davis declared. Due in part to the stationing of United States medical and immigration inspectors abroad, number of immigrants excluded after a long journey to this country was reduced to a minimum.
