

2 Counties Sell Turkey Crop for Total of \$59,152

EMMETT, Dec. 10.—Gem county supplied more than the ordinary share of turkeys to eastern and Pacific coast markets. It is shown in the figures given out here today.

This county shipped three carloads of dressed birds, a total of 68,000 pounds. The year's turkey crop brought growers \$27,000.

Two of the largest producers in the county were Gus Collins, who sold 400 birds which brought \$2,345, and E. Tennyson whose 125 turkeys were sold for \$1,845.

SELL CROP FOR \$32,152

GOODING, Dec. 10.—Gooding county members of the Southern Idaho Turkey Growers' association realized an average of \$5.13 per bird, or a total of \$32,152.21 for 6,195 turkeys that were delivered to Henningsen & company of Caldwell.

The entire shipment, which contained dressed turkeys only, weighed a total of 77,453 pounds. The average weight per bird was approximately 12 1/2 pounds. County Agent O. F. McConnell says that most of the birds were in excellent condition, and were graded as No. ones.

Sheep Killers Do \$1,338.00 Damage

CORVALLIS, Ore., Dec. 10.—The sheep industry has suffered from the sheep killing dog in 1926 as it has for several years past. Claims filed with H. L. Mack, county clerk, covering animals killed during the year amount to \$1,338. The claim covers 82 ewes, five purebred rams, 50 lambs and 3 goats.

As compared with 1925 this is quite a reduction. In that year there were 106 sheep, 137 lambs and 13 goats killed. On a conservative valuation the damage inflicted amounted to \$2,042.50.

Present indications are that the individual owners who have had animals killed will not suffer the heavy loss which they did in 1925.

In 1925 a fund of \$1,150 was collected for dog licenses. This year the dog license fund amounts to \$1,213.70.

Lane County Does Without an Agent

SALEM, Ore., Dec. 10.—No provision will be made in the county budget for a county agent this year.

This much was made plain by members of the county court when, with the Budget committee, they started their first meeting to determine what the county budget should contain this year.

Decision has been reached by the court to place the matter of a county agent on the ballot for the people of the county to vote on at the earliest opportunity, which will be two years from now at the general election, unless by chance the legislature should call a special election next year to vote on referendum measures, as is often done.

THE PRACTICE FOR WOMEN

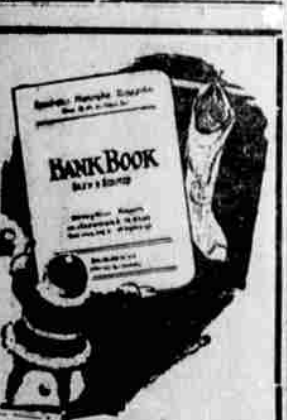

Farm Pointers

Hardwood cutting of deciduous shrubs and roses are placed in sand or sandy loam in a well drained location, says the Oregon station. The cuttings are dug in the spring when roots have formed and planted where they will get careful attention throughout the summer. A "heel" is not necessary on rose cuttings. Well ripened wood 6 or 8 inches long with a clean cut at the base is used. Only hybrid perpetuals and strong growing hybrids are propagated by cuttings as others will make weak roots and are better plants when grafted on hardy stocks.

Dahlia and cannas are stored under the same conditions that keep potatoes satisfactorily. They are thoroughly dried before storing. This is done by spreading them out in a dry, airy place after digging. The danger of losing canna in loss of leaf is if they are stored in boxes of dry sand.

Forget-me-nots and monardella which have outgrown their location are dug up. Cuttings are made of the tops of the forget-me-nots with some roots on each cutting. The cuttings are planted 2 inches deep and 6 inches apart. The monardella are divided and the ground deeply worked and heavily fertilized before replanting.

Hyacinths, tulips and anemones may be planted even in December. Anemone roots are soaked in water several hours and planted 3 inches deep.

Apples fed to swine will not, Dr. B. T. Simms of the Oregon experiment station believes, cause a breaking out on the skin, as a correspondent seems to think. The eruption asked about looks like hives, and appeared on a sow that had been fed rather heavily on apples. The trouble as described seems more like mange, Dr. Simms thinks.

SPANISH MEDAL TO WOMAN

MADRID, (AP)—Rosa Ruiz, who started her own embroidery business at the age of fourteen when her employers went out of business, today at the age of 63 holds in her still sprightly hands the honor of being the first woman in Spain to receive the special bronze medal for labor awarded by the government.

An expert at embroidery which she learned at a convent, she became an embroidery for many of the most aristocratic families in Spain and was virtually private embroiderer for the Royal Palace. With her right somewhat enfeebled she does little fine work now, but often manages to use her needle for four or five hours a day. She recalls when a day's labor averaged sixteen hours. She is president of the Federation of Catholic Women Workers at Madrid.

LADY BARRISTERS BOBBED

LONDON (AP)—Lady Clifton and all the other women barristers of England, with one exception, have bobbed their hair, partly, it is explained, to facilitate the fitting of the legal wigs which they wear when appearing in court.

Cattle and Sheepmen May Unite in Waging War Against Wild Horses

CHEYENNE, Wyo., Dec. 10.

(AP)—A growing menace in the west, the wild horse, promises to unite cattlemen and sheepmen, traditional enemies of the range, in a common fight.

The Wyoming Wool Growers' association, in convention assembled, passed resolutions urging action to legislate the wild cause off the range. The sheepmen further urged the Wyoming Stock Growers' association to join them and indications point to a united effort when the state legislature meets in January.

Eating Valuable Grass

"Can I shoot 'em legally, or what?" asked Henry Cruse, rancher up Lost Spring way, in a letter to the stock growers' association. Several hundred head of wild horses are eating up his grass, and breaking into his pasture and interfering with his best horses, he said. This is typical of hundreds of complaints made by cattlemen and sheepmen over the state.

With the market price of the average range horse quoted at around \$2 per head, f. o. b., Wyoming shipping points and taxes being assessed as usual, owners have allowed the colts in formerly gentle herds to go unclaimed and unbranded. Unestimated and fast increasing thousands of these maverick horses now run the ranges, eating, stamping and even pulling out by the roots grass that otherwise would feed valuable cattle and sheep through a hard winter.
