STATUS OF GOLF TO BE ELEVATED

Pacific Coast Colleges to Make Clod-Busting An Authorized Sport

EUGENE, Ore., Dec. 11 (AP)—Golf, an authorized sport in the Pacific coast conference, will be promoted during the coming year and is soon expected to reach the rating of a minor athletic activity with matches scheduled between various institutions.

When this is reached it will form a new phase of inter-collegiate competition. J. W. Benefield, graduate manager of the University of Oregon and secretary of the P. C. C., said upon his return from the annual conference meeting held in Los Angeles.

To further the playing of the clod-busting game, the conference has announced an all-northwest meet to be held in Corvallis May 29 with another to be held in California during the spring. No definite date for the meet has been named for the southern tourney.

In 1928 a big all-coast tourney will be held, date and place to be named later.

A P. C. C. intercollegiate track meet will be held in Los Angeles, June 3, Benefield stated. This meet will not be strictly a coast meet, but will be open to any man or college upholding rules pertaining to those in effect in the coast conference at present. This means that a man to enter this meet must have amateur standing and represent an institution with a conference rating.

The University of Southern California will play host at this meeting and will have full management.

PELAGOS WONT QUIT

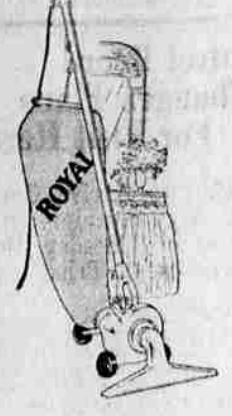
