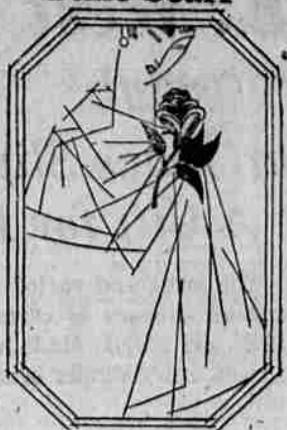

## Sister Mary Says:

**BREAKFAST**—Grapejuice with lemon, cream, thin cream, fried cornmeal mush, syrup, milk, coffee.

**LUNCHEON**—Stuffed onions, whole wheat bread, hearts of celery, carrot pudding, milk, tea.

**DINNER**—Roast beef, brown gravy, potatoe baked with meat, cauliflower in cream sauce, head lettuce with Russian dressing, cranberry bread, apple snow, milk, coffee.

Grapejuice is often "pepped up" by the addition of lemon juice. An appetizer should never be too sweet, for its mission is to whet the appetite and satiate the appetite.

Carrot pudding should endear itself to the cook since it uses no eggs in its composition and at the same time furnishes much nourishment.

**Carrot Pudding**  
One cup grated raw carrot, 1 cup grated raw potato, 1 cup light brown sugar, 1 cup flour, 1 teaspoon soda, 1/2 teaspoon cloves, 1/2 teaspoon cinnamon, 1/4 teaspoon salt, 4 tablespoons melted shortening, 2 tablespoons milk, 1 cup seeded and chopped raisins, 1/4 cup steamed citron.

Sprinkle 2 tablespoons flour over raisins. Mix grated carrot, potato and sugar. Mix and sift flour, salt, soda and spices. Melt the shortening in the mold in which the pudding is to be steamed. This greases the mold as well as prepares the shortening for the pudding. Combine all the ingredients, mixing thoroughly. Turn into greased mold and steam three and one-half hours. Serve warm with hard sauce.

This pudding can be reheated and used the second day.

A lemon sauce can be used if a less rich sauce is preferred. (Copyright, 1926, NEA Service, Inc.)

### ECZEMA AND OTHER SKIN DISEASES

Member Gorgas Memorial Inst. Probably no term is more familiar among affections of the skin than that of eczema. To many people eczema is almost synonymous with any eruption on the skin and only a few years past many physicians had the same idea. But now the term eczema has come to have a more and more limited meaning.

In the first place many diseases which have no relation whatever to eczema have a good many points in common with it, upon superficial observation. In this group are included certain types of tuberculosis of the skin, and skin rashes which are the direct result of taking some particular drug or unsuitable type of food.

A second group still more closely resembling eczema are those inflammations of the skin which are caused directly by some external irritant. I refer to the skin specialists call a dermatitis.

The primrose will do the same thing to many people. This group is of much economic importance to employers, as many men who work with acids, chemicals, and dyes, develop an inflammation of the skin.

A similar group is also found among women who develop a der-

matitis of the face as a result of using certain hair dyes, cosmetics and other cosmetics or by the wearing of furs which have been dyed by certain dyes.

A third group has gained much prominence recently and resembles eczema so closely that until the past few years it baffled even specialists in skin diseases.

This is a type of ring-worm, though this condition is not a "worm" and usually not a "ring". It is really an inflammation of the skin caused by a fungus or mold and is often contracted around bath houses, swimming pools, or by close contact with affected individuals.

It frequently starts between the toes or fingers, causing severe itching. Since the discovery of this fungus doctors now realize that many cases formerly called eczema were really due to this low form of vegetable life.

This narrows the field down to the true eczema. Science has much to learn yet regarding the true nature of this disease. Such a diagnosis is usually made by a process of elimination.

In general the term eczema, when properly used, designates those more or less chronic or recurrent inflammations of the skin

The cheerful functioning of all parts of the body never results when the tissue is starved and the vitality depleted—which follow irregular or incomplete elimination.

The method which will insure a successful, smoothly operating bodily machine is: Full absorption of necessary food elements—complete and regular elimination of waste.
