FARM RELIEF MEASURE IS INTRODUCED

price standards are omitted. The aim is to provide funds drawn from each commodity to be employed in stabilizing the market for that commodity by sound commercial methods.

Nominating Committee

"The federal farm board would have a nominating committee chosen by farm organizations to make nominations to the president for membership of the board. Non-salaried commodity advisory counsel for each commodity would be appointed by the board from representative producers' associations. The qualification for would be collected at the most convenient point along the commodity's route to market. Loans not exceeding \$25,000 could be made by the board to the cooperative organizations for paying the cost of storage and processing. Loans to cooperatives would not be restricted to handlers of the five basic commodities but might be made to associations handling any farm commodities.

"This provision will enable the board to accomplish all that can be accomplished in the way of farm relief through loans to cooperatives," senator McNary said.

FRAZIER WELCOMED

WASHINGTON, Dec. 14 (AP)—Banned after the 1924 election as a political undesirable in the republican ranks, Senator Frazier, North Dakota insurgent, was formally welcomed back into the fold today by unanimous vote of the republican senate conference.

Senator Frazier was not present when the action, which will automatically invite him to all party conferences in the future, was taken. It also was voted to confirm recommendations made by the committee on committees, which puts Senator Frazier in line for the chairmanship of the Indian Affairs committee after March 4 and re-instating him to his former place on other committees. Designation of Senator Norris, Nebraska, as chairman of the judiciary committee; McNary, Oregon, as chairman of the agriculture committee; Phillips, Colorado, as chairman of the irrigation committee and Coughlin, Michigan, as chairman of the education and labor committee, also was approved.

OPEN IMMIGRATION GATES

WASHINGTON, Dec. 14 (AP)—The senate voted today to open the immigration gates to 35,000 wives and minor children of aliens admitted prior to July 1, 1924, who have applied for naturalization.

'Thumbs Down' on Lane County Jail

EUGENE, Ore., Dec. 14 (AP)—Lane county will have to take immediate steps to relieve the congestion at the county jail, it was decided following a meeting of the county court today with Dr. S. M. Kerron, health officer. Transfer of a large number of the jail inmates to the Multnomah county jail is offered as a solution.

Dr. Kerron with Dr. Frederick

Stricker, state officer, recently made a thorough inspection of the Lane county jail, and the opinion of the state doctor was that no more than 24 prisoners should be housed there at one time. At the present time there are 45 inmates.

SALT LAKE CITY, Dec. 14 (AP)

Sub-zero temperatures took one life in Utah today. Diminick Delacoe, 35, a miner, was found dead in the yard of a general store at Park City, 20 miles east of here. Physicians said he had frozen to death. The thermometer there registered eight degrees below zero.

BITTER COLD SWEEPS INTO EAST TODAY

12 BELOW IN PENDLETON

PENDLETON, Ore., Dec. 14 (AP)—Winter settled firmly in Pendleton last night some mercuries registering 12 below zero. This morning at 10 o'clock it was still 2 below.

COLD IN EUGENE

EUGENE, Ore., Dec. 14 (AP)—The temperature in Eugene went down to 21 degrees last night, the coldest since Dec. 1924, when the mercury once slipped to 16 degrees. Reports of a blizzard on the summit of the Cascades at McKenzie pass were brought back here yesterday by a party of motorists who came through Sunday night, just before the pass became so filled with snow that vehicular traffic was halted.

The snow is 18 inches deep, and in some places more than that, according to the reports. A blizzard was raging Sunday night, and the snow was drifting into the road in great banks.

Fields on the new Cascade line of the Southern Pacific railroad reported 18 inches of snow yesterday. It was still snowing.

10 ABOVE IN PORTLAND

PORTLAND, Ore., Dec. 14 (AP)—Oregon continued in an icy grip. It was 10 above at Portland. Bright, cold sunshine weather prevailed today, with an east wind, but relief was sighted by the weather bureau, which promised a south wind tomorrow.
