Many Hogs From Cottonwood, Ida.

COTTONWOOD, Ida., Dec. 15.—During November 1355 hogs were shipped from here and in December it is expected that no less than 1000 will be sent to market from this region, according to G. W. Tarbot, manager of the Farmers' Union warehouse, through which virtually all shipments are made.

Shipments last month netted the raisers \$11.50 to 100 pounds, live weight, and this price is looked upon as profitable. During 1925 about 7000 hogs were shipped from here and so enthusiastic are growers over the outlook that virtually every farmer is engaged in this industry. Spokane and Tacoma are the objectives of most shipments.

Three carloads of prime steers went from here yesterday, the price paid at cars being 7 cents a pound. Before the end of the year it is expected that cattle shipments will reach 20 cars.

Cottonwood leads in hogs among Camas prairie towns, but Grangeville, through its closer connection with the White Bird and Salmon river regions, exceeds in cattle and sheep shipments. The principal shippers of this region are Kashmitter Brothers, Anton Jansen, B. Leutenfeld and Joseph Reiter.

The mild weather and plentiful rains have placed the range country in the best shape it has been for years, there being lots of grass and watering places.

MRS. BASSETT LED TICKET OKLAHOMA CITY (AP) — A mother of three children, Mrs. Mabel Bassett led the democratic ticket in the general election in Oklahoma.

Although the names of a number of popular state officials were on the ticket, Mrs. Bassett had a plurality of 69,295 votes over her male republican opponent for the office of commissioner of charities and corrections, to which she was seeking reelection. Her popularity is attributed to the fact that for 16 years she has been active in welfare work in a number of which she served without salary.
