PREVENTION OF MEASLES LIKELY

Germ Isolated and Toxin Discovered — Oregon to Take Up Work

Having just returned from a visit to the state health departments of the states of New Jersey, New York, Pennsylvania, Michigan, Iowa, Kansas, Colorado and Utah, I am pleased to report that rapid progress is being made in the prevention of the communicable disease measles. In 1925, Measles when they are immunizing children against diphtheria, there is a great reduction in the number of cases and deaths from diphtheria. The task of preventing another fever is also receiving increasing attention.

In one of our weekly letters it was predicted that measles would soon fall under the head of the curable diseases. This prediction seems about to be fulfilled. The virus is now made that measles is caused by the specific virus, measles virus. This means that a chain-like organism producing virus growth on culture media is the cause of one of the most common communicable diseases, measles. The virus has been isolated in a pure culture from the blood of patients in the early stages of the disease. It is a small, green-producing organism which forms a spherical mass of virus particles in solution. The toxin was found in both the serum and the cells. Proof of the virus being the cause of measles was demonstrated by experiments on persons susceptible and those immune to measles as well as on persons suffering with the disease, also on rabbits and other animals.

Small doses of this poison applied to the skin of persons who have not had measles give a characteristic skin reaction. Persons who have had the disease or have been immunized against measles, give no reaction. If this work is continued this will give us a test for susceptibility in making the size of the tick and check tests for scarlet fever and diphtheria respectively.




