

Farmers' Dollar
Worth About 83
Cents Is Claim

NEW YORK, Dec. 16 (AP)—The kernel of the whole agricultural problem is in the difference between the value of what a farmer sells and what he buys. Senator Arthur Capper, of Kansas, told the New York Kiwanis club at luncheon here. He said a farmer's dollar is worth about 83 cents while the rest of us have a dollar with an exchange value of 100 cents.

The increase of 500 per cent in farm mortgage indebtedness, the decrease of 25 per cent in farm values and the continuing farm abandonment are commanding indications of America's serious farm problem. Senator Capper said. "Last year the producers received about \$10,000,000,000 for the products of the farm. The consumers paid approximately \$10,000,000,000 for these products. The spread between producer and consumer was entirely too great."

To put national progress and national prosperity on a stable foundation the agriculture industry should be placed on an economic equality with the rest of the producing United States, Senator Capper believes. Trade and business are so closely related to agriculture, he said, that neither may truly prosper unless all prosper.

"Farm forces of the west and south are demanding of congress that it make a national agricultural policy the first business of the present session. They ask for a federal marketing board, appointed by the president in market-making. They believe this would greatly aid farmer cooperative associations to put their business on a profitable basis."

"I hope to see favorable action upon this legislative proposal within the next few weeks."

"How prevented," is a fair question, and "where?"

The world's greatest sanitarian, General Gorgas, in whose honor this institute has been established as a memorial to his inestimable services to the world, has shown most conclusively by his work in the Panama Canal zone that malaria can be eradicated over an extensive area by thorough anti-mosquito measures.

Inspired by this example, similar measures are now beginning to be practiced more extensively in this country, despite the fact that no attempts were made to control disease bearing mosquitoes in the United States until 1912. Then malaria surveys were first made in Virginia and North Carolina by the late Dr. H. H. Carter, of the United States Public Health Service, upon his return from service with

Gorgas in Panama.

"As an illustration of the change of the public attitude toward malaria control and mosquito elimination that has taken place since 1914," said Joseph A. Le Prince, at the October meeting of the American Society of Civil Engineers in Philadelphia, "the Federal Health Service has co-operated with state health departments in malaria control measures in 342 communities in 215 counties in 17 states; and in activities connected with mosquito surveys, control measures, and investigations in 667 communities in 376 counties in 24 states."

"The control of malaria by controlling malaria mosquitoes is more complicated than the control of yellow fever, but it can be done if we will only permit the good work to go on."

MALARIA—ITS NATURE AND PREVENTION

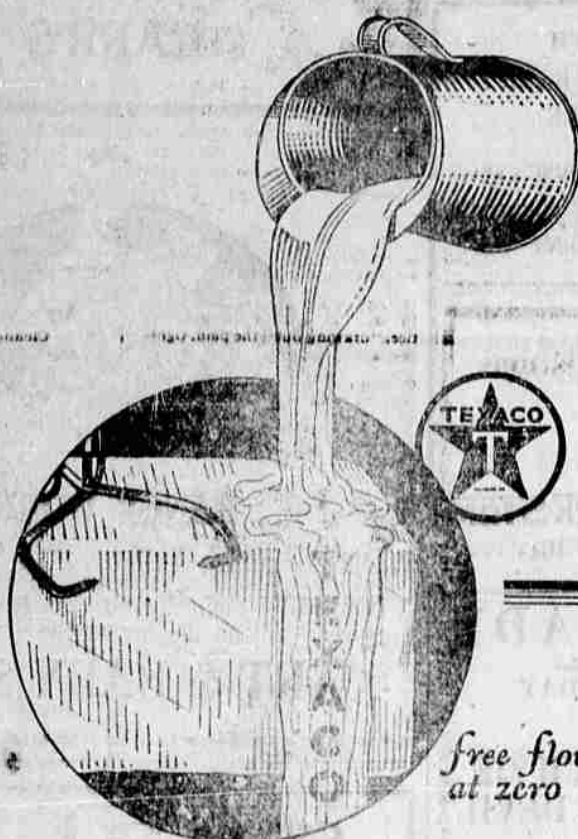
It seems quite pertinent that discussion of a disease condition of great importance to the national welfare should deal with an affection with which General William Crawford Gorgas, himself, was most intimately associated during the prosecution of his great health work, and which gave him undying international fame.

Malaria is the disease. Each year, in the United States, 3,000,000 persons become ill with malaria, and 3,000 die as an immediate result of the disease. The cost to the nation exceeds \$100,000,000.00. And malaria is preventable.

Malaria, from the earliest times, has been one of the greatest scourges of the human race. Hippocrates, in the fifth century before Christ, described the clinical manifestations of the disease. From that time on it has exacted a heavy toll from the human race, and many of the most attractive portions of the earth have been rendered uninhabitable and undeveloped on its account.

Although the medical profession has long understood the symptoms of malarial infection, the specific cause of the disease was unknown until 1880, when Laveran discovered the germ in the blood of a human subject, sick with the disease in Algiers.

Not until 1897, seventeen years after this epoch-making discovery, was the means of introducing the germ into the human body discovered by Sir Ronald Ross, the English observer. He proved that
