

LEGUMES PROVE GOOD HOG FEED

Husbandry Professor at
W. S. C. Says Pork
Chops Not Doomed

PELLMAN, Dec. 18.—Although one would be led to believe that pork chops are doomed to disappear from the face of the earth after reading and hearing some of the discussions on the feeding of minerals to hogs, Jerry Sotola of the animal husbandry department of the state college thinks there is little need for worry if the feeder uses a few precautions.

When hogs are fed balanced rations, including animal products like tankage or good alfalfa hay or perhaps alfalfa pasture, there is no need of using any mineral supplement except common salt, Professor Sotola maintains.

However, when hogs are fed cereal grains or their by-products and again when these are fed with vegetable supplements like dressed meat, soybeans, or soybean meal without pasture or legume hay, then it pays to feed some minerals, according to Sotola. Calcium in the form of lime is usually fed, he says.

"As a result of experiments last year it was shown that growing gilts fed on alfalfa pasture, supplemented with wheat middlings and tankage did not require additional mineral feed. Adding 2 per cent steamed bone meal to the grain mixture or 2 per cent ground limestone produced no returns.

"Lime can be supplied cheaply as finely ground limestone, air-slacked lime, chaff or wood ashes.

Wheat and its by-products are high in phosphorus, but should such feeds be absent in the ration, then phosphorus can be supplied in such forms as steamed bone meal, spent bone black or even ground rock phosphate. The bone products are preferred to the phosphate however. One or two pounds of good mineral mixture to each 100 pounds of feed is enough. Some feeders prefer to provide the mixture from a self-feeder.

Opalite Newest Boom Town Near McDermitt, Ore.

VALE, Ore., Dec. 15.—Opalite located in an isolated section of the country 20 miles from McDermitt, is the newest boom town of Malheur county. "It is a regular city with its new electric lights and splendid highway to McDermitt, built by the Mercury Mining Syndicate of San Francisco," said F. A. Sage, resident of Opalite, who made a trip to the county seat recently to complete final proof on his homestead.

"Over 50 men are employed now and by next spring there will be more. Next year a school will be built so that families may reside near the mine. The mining engineers have estimated that there is \$4,000,000 worth of ore in sight and indications of a still greater deposit. The new plant which takes the quicksilver from the ore by a very novel process, has been in operation about three weeks."

"Yes, sir we've got the finest little ole town in the state," the local booster assured the visiting motorist.

SHAKER'S CURSE HURTS LEBANON

Nearby City of Dayton,
Ohio, Prospers—Superstitions Aroused

LEBANON, O., (AP)—Has the Shaker's curse, called down upon the village of Lebanon more than a century ago, come true?

Has the blessing pronounced upon the then neighboring village of Dayton at the same time been realized? Superstition clings to the soil, and in this little town, despite the influence of education and science, many may be found who believe the century-old curse and blessing have been efficacious. And they point to the two towns today as proof.

Were Rival Centers
When the nineteenth century was but a few years old, a colony of Shakers was founded near here, known as Talcott Village. About the same time a colony of Shakers called Watervliet was founded near Dayton.

The people of Lebanon reviled and persecuted their pious, prosperous neighbors. Mobs visited Union Village bent on mischief. Life became almost unbearable at times for the "brothers" and "sisters". Oddly enough, however, the best of feeling existed between the Watervliet Shakers and the people

of Dayton, and the intercourse of the two communities was almost invariably pleasant and friendly.

In 1820 an elder at Union Village announced that in a vision the Lord had instructed the Shakers to pronounce a curse upon Lebanon and its people and a blessing upon Dayton. There was some demur, but presently two elders appeared on horseback in the streets of Lebanon and galloped up and down calling the curse of the Lord upon the village for the intolerance and bigotry of its people. Later in the same day, the two elders appeared on a street in Dayton, and waving their hats as they rode called upon the Lord to bless the town and its citizens.

"Look at Dayton today, and look at Lebanon," offer the believers, in proof that the curse and the blessing alike have been realized. "Both towns were the same size back in 1820—about 1,000 persons in each. Now Dayton is a prosperous manufacturing city of nearly 200,000 people and Lebanon is still a village of only two or three thousand."

A history of Shakerism, relates that immediately after the pronouncements, hundreds of superstitious settlers, with visions of Dayton's future greatness hastened to move there, forming the nucleus for the city of today.
